### Area VII Director's Seminar

rea VII Director's Seminars are on the move throughout the Area. This year, the event will be held at the Olivet Lutheran Church in Fargo, North Dakota, on September 23-24, 2011. You may attend either the Friday or Saturday session, but you will learn much more by attending both sessions.

**Morna-June Morrow**, a familiar name to many in Area VII and a member/leader in the Manitoba (Canada) Guild, will lead the seminar.

The Friday night session on September 23 (7 to 9 p.m.) will be a Reading Session of fine handbell music, some of which are new releases. Registrants will sight-read up to fifteen handbell selections, learning a variety of things from each piece. Both ringers and directors are encouraged to enroll in this session.

Saturday's session on September 24 (9 a.m. to 4 p.m.) is a hands-on session for directors where you will learn how to maximize bell techniques, receive rehearsal and performance tips, and touch on visual choreography. Three pieces of music are included in your registration fee. These pieces will be the focus of the Saturday session and will also be used at the end of the session to perform a mini-concert, which serves as a Seminar wrap-up.

#### Meet the clinician

Morna-June Morrow (A.R.C.T., A.M.M., B. Mus., B. Ed., M. Ed., Orff Cert.)



Morna-June (M-J) has been involved with handbell ringing since she had a fortyminute "crash" course from Fred Merrett in March 1969. She has given handbell workshops in seven provinces and in Minnesota. While National Chair of the Handbell Guilds of Canada, she was the Canadian massed ringing conductor at the 9<sup>th</sup> International Handbell Symposium in Birmingham, England. She conducts the Westworth United Church Chapel Bells, plays in All Chim'in Festival Quartet, and plays solo bells. A festival adjudicator of handbells, recorders and Orff classes across western Canada, she is currently Past President of the Winnipeg Music Festival. She serves as Past Chair. Editor and Archivist of the Manitoba Guild of English Handbell Ringers.

M-J was Founding President of the Manitoba Orff Chapter and served as National President of Carl Orff Canada, becoming the first music educator in western Canada to receive an Honorary Life Membership. Upon her retirement as music specialist/supervisor in 1998, the Manitoba Orff Chapter established the *"Morna-June Morrow Award for Excellence in Music Education in Manitoba".*

t's not too late to register for Young Ringers Camp (YRC) that will again be held at Ironwood Springs Christian Camp outside of Rochester, Minnesota, on June 24-26, 2011. Camp officially begins at 1 p.m. on Friday and ends with a final concert open to the public on Sunday at 11 a.m. This will be the fourth biennial Area VII Young Ringers Camp.

All 4th-8th graders are invited to come and play bells, experience the challenge course, ride horseback, swim, and climb the climbing wall. There will also be campfires, s'mores, lots of singing and even a few jokes.

Remember all those handbell Bible stories? Tammy Waldrop is the composer of the Ring A Story series and will also be our clinician. She is VERY excited about joining us in Minnesota!

**Tammy Waldrop** is from New Caney, Texas, and she has written some of our favorite handbell music (over 350 pieces)! She is a graduate of Baylor University and is currently the Handbell Editor/Associate Church Choral Editor for Alfred Publishing.

As in the past, there will be two ringing divisions—level 1 and level 2—as well as massed ringing. The final piece, which will be learned at the camp, is *Kingsport Procession* by Kath Wissinger, AGEHR AG35293, L2, 3-5 octaves. Participating choirs are invited to ring a solo piece at the final concert. **The final concert is open to the public.** 

Registration received after April 1 will be \$170 for ringers/directors and \$150 for non-ringers and chaperones. A male and female chaperone will be required if you bring both boys and girls.

## **Spring Ring**

he Spring Ring event will be held at St. Mary's Catholic Church in Alexandria, Minnesota, on April 29-30, 2011. This event will be patterned after the Anthornis event, but the music will be a little easier.

Lee Afdahl, AGEHR President-Elect, will be our clinician. There will be two sessions. The session on Friday evening (6:30 - 9 p.m.) will give you hands-on experience ringing music that is Level 4(+), offering seasoned ringers an opportunity to ring new music while honing their techniques and improving their ringing skills. This unique ringing experience is meant to *challenge and stretch* your ringing and musicality skills. The Saturday session will begin at 8:30 a.m. and will involve rehearsing and polishing four massed ringing pieces of music and performing them in concert at 3:15 p.m. on Saturday afternoon. The concert will be open to the public. Participating choirs are invited to ring a solo piece (or two) to round out the concert. Music for the massed ringing should be rehearsed in advanced so the clinician can work on musicality.

#### **Play as Written**

A bell choir devotional from Brenda Barta

*Jeremiah29:11 (NIV) "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future."* 

When composers and arrangers create a piece of music, they include dynamic markings. The markings convey their vision of how the piece should be performed. We can take some liberties with the markings but in general, the music should be played as written.

And so it is with God. His song is the Bible. There wasn't much sweet music during the Old Testament times. It was disharmonious clanging as at the Tower of Babel. Everyone was playing their own tune in their own key.

In response to the chaos, God sent his son to direct the world's music. Christ holds the director's baton and sets the tempo of our lives. If we pay attention and follow his lead, we will be blessed. Bell ringers know the feeling. It is the goose bump moment following the flawless execution of a piece of music. Even smaller things like a chord that is together or a run that flows can give a tingle.

There are many dynamic markings in the Bible – the 10 commandments, the Beatitudes and the parables. Learning to live in this way requires dedication and practice. The same is required of bell ringers: dedication to the art and other ringers, and regular practice of the notes.

As with bell ringers and choirs there is a wide range of experience. Some members are new and hit more "bad notes" than those with expertise. There are Christians too who are young in their faith while others are masters of the lifestyle.

There are dynamic markings for living and Jesus is ready to lead us. All we have to do is read them and practice them, and follow the Director.

Greetings from North Dakota where we are preparing for major flooding this spring! Yes, I know it is already March but in North Dakota spring can be reluctant to show up some years. Just a reminder to everyone that handbells do not like water!

Last June, North Dakota had 19 ringers and directors make the trip to the Festival in Rochester. Several gals from Bismarck and Minot drove 12-14 hours to attend and had glowing reports about the festival. Thanks to all of you who made the trip and I am hoping many of you will make the trek to Duluth in 2012! As the Sub-Area Chair it is a lot of fun to meet and visit with members that I normally only get to talk to by phone or e-mail. As a director it is a lot of fun to learn from the handbell world's best clinicians!

North Dakota received another C.H.I.M.E. grant this year! Area 7 placed a 3-octave set of Handbells in the classroom of Kris Kietzman at Edgeley Public School for the students to use, free, for the school year. Kris and the students enjoyed using the handchimes so much that they requested, and received, another grant. Kris uses the bells to teach basic music theory and note reading to elementary students, performs in concerts, and even has the high school students accompanying themselves while singing! She says the kids think that playing the bells is a "real treat."

Last September the Twin Cities Bronze brought their Insights into Artistry workshop to Grand Forks! The ringers attending not only learned a lot about ringing bells but were also featured in a Grand Forks Herald newspaper article the next day.

Vincent Methodist Church in Minot and First Presbyterian Church in Fargo have both started intergenerational handbell choirs and report that not only do the kids and adult ringers enjoy the interaction, learning, and mentoring, but the congregations love it! What a great way to fill out the numbers needed for a handbell choir!

Many North Dakota choirs performed concerts during the year including St. John's from Dickinson (whose director, Cheryl Hewson, also performed a bell solo), the Bethany Bellievers from Bethany Lutheran Church in Minot, and Tammie Vernon's bell choir from Hazen who incorporate a Death by Chocolate fundraiser and concert together.

Three Grand Forks area handbell choirs are performing a concert on Palm Sunday, April 17 at 4 p.m. at Calvary Lutheran Church. The choirs will all ring solo numbers as well as participate in massed ringing.

### **Twin Cities Metro**

On Saturday February 12, the Holy Name Ringers under the direction of JoBeth Ranfranz were guests at the Basilica of St. Mary in their Missa Choralis Series. They were joined by The David Jorlette Chorale and The Trinity Chamber Singers. The event began with prelude music prior to Mass and continued with the regular Saturday, Vigil Liturgy. The ringers played an arrangement of *Jesu Joy of Man's Desiring*, an original composition by Michael Helman called *Nocturne No. 2*, and closed with a bells and organ arrangement of *Lobe Den Herren (Praise to the Lord the Almighty*) with principal organist, Chris Stroh.

The philosophy of the Missa Choralis Series is to bring groups in to the Basilica so they can experience the space, and the congregation can experience a variety of choirs. The result was met with acclaim!

## **Tips and tidbits**

#### **MUSIC THEORY.aargh**©

(For ringers: Session 3a: pitch)

The Major and Minor Scales

*tonic* of a composition (see Session 1, November 2010 issue of Clapper Chatter) and can read a *key signature* (see session 2a in the January 2011 issue) it is time to read *scale.* This session will begin to examine Major and Minor scales.

When we spell the Major or Minor scale every letter of the musical alphabet is used, "A" through "G". This helps to determine if a note is called a *flat* or a *sharp*. A flat lowers a pitch by a half step (A to Ab) and a sharp raises the pitch by a half step (A to A#). Scales consist of an ascending series of half steps and whole steps. A half step is the shortest distance between two pitches. On the piano keyboard there are half steps between the white keys E---F and B---C. There are also half steps between white and black keys, for example, C---Db. A whole step is two half steps. On the piano keyboard there are whole steps between white keys C---D, D---E, F---G, G---A, and A---- B. There are also whole steps between white and black keys, for example, B---C#, E--- F#, Bb---C. And there are whole steps between black keys, for example, F#---G#. We spell the scale "A, B, C#, D, E, F#, G#, A" rather than "A, B, Db, D, E, F#, G#, A" in order that there are seven different letters in the scale.

A Major scale has whole steps between all the notes except pitches  $3^{rd}$  and  $4^{th}$ , and  $7^{th}$  and 8th. Those notes are separated by half steps. The "C Major scale" uses all the white keys on the keyboard. "C" is *tonic* and the pitches used are "C, D, E, F, G, A, B, C." (There are no sharps or flats in the key signature.) In order to have a major scale beginning on "D" the pitches used would need to be "D, E, F#, G, A, B, C#, D." (This spelling allows for whole steps between all notes except the 3---4 and the 7-- 8.) Since "F" and "C" will be consistently sharp in this scale those pitches are indicated in the *key signature.* 

In the Minor scale the half steps occur between pitches 2---3 and 5---6, all of the other pitches are whole steps apart. If "A" is tonic and the pitches of the scale are "A, B, C, D, E, F, G, A" the scale is called "A Minor". (There are no sharps or flats in the key signature.) If the scale is minor and tonic is "D", the spelling of the scale will be "D, E, F, G, A, Bb, C, D." There are half steps between E---F, and A---Bb. "Bb" is part of this scale and will be in the key signature.

#### (For ringers: Session 3b: rhythm)

#### Why do composers sometimes pick the meters they do?


**Celtic Praise (The Rap):** Composer: Rolf Løvland; Arranged by Kevin McChesney; Publisher 1995 Universal Music Publishing -Norway, this arrangement 2009 by Universal Music Publishing. ("The Rap" was recorded by the Løvland's duo called "Secret Garden".)

When listening to Løvland's recording of "The Rap", one hears the beats organized in groups of eighth notes in this order: 3, 3, 2, and 2. Kevin McChesney has written these beats in a meter of 5 quarter notes per measure (5/4) because Løvland used this meter. Five quarter notes per measure equals 10 eighth notes. These are in groups of 3+3+2+2 eighths. Later in the composition, we see the meter of six, three, and seven quarters. The arranger said that the composer chose the "lowest common denominator" (the 4=quarter) and that he decided to do that also.

Modern rhythms are not always "square". They have been called complex, irregular, asymmetrical, unbalanced, combination, and additive meters. But, these meters do show the intent of the composer as far as accent. The first beat of the measure is more accented than the rest of the beats. As we discussed in the last column (Session 2b Jan. 2011) the purpose of a barline is to provide accent to the rhythmic organization of the composition. The barline in "Celtic Praise" clearly shows the intended rhythmic accent on the first beat of every measure. This makes measures of unequal lengths.

In <u>Celtic Praise</u> the barlines, and with them the accent of the rhythm, aid the reader in finding the organization of the phrases. After a small introduction, the first section consists of two phrases ending in measure 13. (Each section begins with a pick-up beat of two quarter notes.) These phrases are repeated in measures 14-22 (but written out because of added notes). Next there is a contrasting phrase to measure 28, then measures 29-34 repeats the phrase from measures 9-13. The rest of the composition repeats most of this music, but in the key of F Major; a small interlude takes the key from C Major to F Major, and a short codetta ends the piece firmly in F Major.

Performing the work is another issue. How are you to interpret the rhythmic patterns within each measure? All measures begin with groups of 3 eighth notes and most end with a group of 2 eighth notes. This is the sound of the composition, and is probably the best method for the interpretation of the beats. See if counting and conducting the eighth notes "one-two-three, onetwo-three, one-two, one-two", etc. aids the readers of this asymmetrical, modern, and very interesting work.
