Issue 2: Sub-Domain (all the same, no cost to Areas) vs. New-Domain (each Area with own, cost to Areas)

Sub-Domain – Vote 12 – 0

Issue 3: Standard Area Logo (all the same, no cost to Areas) vs. Individual Area Logos (each Area with own design, cost to each Area)

Standard Area Logo – Vote 9 – 3

There was a lot of discussion on this issue as some Areas have developed their own design and wanted to use it. The conversation always came back to "Are we 1 organization or 13 individual organizations?"

Four area representatives will work with the National Staff person to develop a Logo for all. "All for One and One for All".

Area 7 Director's Seminar

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Lutheran Church in Fargo, North Dakota, on September 23-24, 2011. You may attend either the Friday or Saturday session, but you will learn much more by attending both sessions.

Morna-June Morrow, a familiar name to many in Area 7 and a member/leader in the Manitoba (Canada) Guild, will lead both sessions of the seminar.

The Friday night session on September 23 (7 to 9 p.m.) will be a Reading Session of fine handbell music. and six of the pieces are included in the repertoire for the upcoming 2012 Festival Conference in Duluth, Minnesota. Registrants will sight-read up to fifteen handbell selections, learning a variety of things from each piece. Both ringers and directors are encouraged to enroll in this session. Saturday's session on September 24 (9 a.m. to 4 p.m.) is a hands-on session for directors where you will learn how to maximize bell techniques, receive rehearsal and performance tips, and touch on ways ringers can make notations on their music. Three pieces of music are included in your registration fee. (Aria — Allured, National Music Publishers, HB514; Standin' in the Need of Prayer Stephenson, Choristers Guild, CGB534; Prelude on Thaxted — Helman, AGEHR, AG36045) These pieces will be the focus of the Saturday session and will also be used at the end of the session to perform a mini-concert, which serves as a Seminar wrap-up.

Scholarships From Jessica Westgard

oving to the northwestern part of Area 7, this year's Director's Seminar will be held at the Olivet

Morna-June Morrow (A.R.C.T., A.M.M., B. Mus., B. Ed., M. Ed., Orff Cert.)

Morna-June (M-J) has been involved with handbell ringing since she had a fortyminute "crash" course from Fred Merrett in March 1969. She has given handbell workshops in seven provinces and in Minnesota, While National Chair of the Handbell Guilds of Canada, she was the Canadian massed



ringing conductor at the 9th International Handbell Symposium in Birmingham, England. She conducts the Westworth United Church Chapel Bells, plays in All Chim'in Festival Quartet, and plays solo bells. A festival adjudicator of handbells, recorders and Orff classes across western Canada, she is currently Past President of the Winnipeg Music Festival. She serves as Past Chair, Editor and Archivist of the Manitoba Guild of English Handbell Ringers.

M-J was Founding President of the Manitoba Orff Chapter and served as National President of Carl Orff Canada, becoming the first music educator in western Canada to receive an Honorary Life Membership. Upon her retirement as music specialist/supervisor in 1998, the Manitoba Orff Chapter established the "Morna-June Morrow Award for Excellence in Music Education in Manitoba."

Friday night is a Reading Session of more difficult music. Not as many selections are chosen, so the ringers can get the full sense and variety of more challenging, yet attainable music.

Saturday starts at 8:30 a.m. with rehearsals of the selected repertoire. The day ends with a free public concert at 4 p.m. A catered lunch will be provided as part of the registration fee.

Because most handbell choirs consist of members with various ringing skills, not all individuals are willing to accept the challenge. Therefore, we encourage and welcome individuals or small groups of ringers to attend and join an orphan choir.

To assist in preparing the music, orphan choirs have been established throughout the Area. An orphan choir consists of individual ringers wishing to practice as a group, usually with six rehearsals, starting the first week of January.



Meet the clinicians

David L. Weck is founder and director of The Agape Ringers, an auditioned handbell ensemble from Chicago, Illinois. As full-time music editor with Agape/Hope Publishing Company of Carol Stream, Illinois, he is responsible for the handbell catalog consisting of more than 800 titles.

David is in demand as clinician throughout the year and has been director of numerous national and international handbell events including the 2004 *International Handbell Symposium* in Toronto, the 2008 *International Symposium* in Orlando, Florida, and the 2010 *International Symposium* in

Osaka, Japan. In 2005, he served as Guest Conductor for the *Summer Workshop* of The Handbell Ringers of Japan. It was a special honor for David to serve as a guest co-conductor at the 2009 *Distinctly Bronze* and currently, he is pleased to be conducting the 2012 *Distinctly Bronze* events.

David has served on the national board of the AGEHR and was given the Midwest States' *Area VIII Outstanding Service Award.* For 40 years, David has been involved in choral music through music education, church music and as assistant director of the Chicago Community Renewal Chorus.

He and his wife, Jane Holstein, reside in Wheaton, Illinois, were they enjoy spending their spare time with grandchildren, Becky and Jack.

Dr. John Behnke is Professor of Music at Concordia University in Mequon, Wisconsin, where

he teaches organ and directs The Alleluia Ringers, Concordia's touring college handbell choir, and the Milwaukee Handbell Ensemble (MHE), a community choir from Milwaukee.

Dr. Behnke is also Music Editor for The American Guild of English Handbell Ringers. He is a frequent handbell clinician, festival director, and organ recitalist. He enjoys composing and

appy summer! Hopefully by the time you are reading this, warmer, dryer weather has

I'm writing this article as my young ringers are in rehearsal at the Young Ringers Camp (YRC).

Do you have a young ringer's group at your organization? If you do, then you know the challenges that come with it, as well as the great joy they can bring. Some challenges are school conflicts (sports, drama), different levels of ringing abilities and a variety of ages. But, I can tell you that the joy of seeing the smiles on their faces when they know they have mastered

a piece they just played during worship outshines any challenge posed.

I believe the key to starting a successful young ringers program is to "Get them while they're young!" Kids in grade K-3



can easily handle handchimes as well as the smaller bells. I start my kids once they enter 4th grade. By 5th or 6th grade some are starting to shelly ring and most have mastered a variety of techniques. Kids are fearless! They are much more apt to try new things that adults would never consider, i.e. changing ringing positions.

Conflicts with school activities are just that, conflicts. I find being flexible is the key. Maybe they won't make the entire rehearsal, but working with them so they don't have to choose one activity over another will keep them coming back.

Different levels of ringing abilities are also a challenge. Take time to choose music appropriate to the group's abilities. If you have strong treble ringers, look for music that shows off that section. You need to keep your more advanced ringers challenged and interested and at the same time allow the beginner ringer

to participate and learn. Music with a variety of techniques, i.e. mallets, echos, TD, etc., are always favorite pieces. Consider positioning your ringers so one can mentor another.

At camp this weekend, there is a younger, beginner group that needed a little extra help with a piece. Sandy Mullaney, the clinician, asked an older, more experienced group to play with them. For positioning, she arranged them every other one, i.e. a younger ringer was paired with an older ringer, who then became the teacher/mentor. It was a great arrangement and enjoyed by all.

I have been fortunate to have two successful young ringers groups. This past May, I said farewell to four senior boys who have been ringing since they were in 4th grade. During this same year, I welcomed four 4th grade girls into the group. It's the bell circle of life!

If you don't have a young ringer's program at your organization or if you have tried unsuccessfully in the past, give it a try (again). Be flexible, choose interesting, fun, kid friendly music, use your resources (other ringers), AND...start 'em young!

New board member

Please welcome the newest member of the Area 7 Board of Directors, Northern Minnesota Sub-Area Chair, Kevin Edstrom.

Kevin started ringing handbells with the New Horizon Ringers at Our Saviour's Lutheran Church in Hastings, Minnesota, in the mid 1980s. It wasn't long until he became totally addicted to bells. If he discovered anything new to do with bells, he would try it.

After attending an area festival where someone played a solo, Kevin decided he wanted to try it, and he did. He is a versatile ringer with experience in bass bells and four-in-hand.

While teaching in Glencoe, Minnesota, during the 1990s, he located a lost 2-octave set of bells at the First Congregational Church that the pastor was going to throw away. Kevin made contact with the pastor to look at the bells. They were tarnished and needed some TLC, but were very useable.

Soon there were two new handbell choirs, The Praise Ringers at the Congregational Church and the Rejoice Ringers at Christ Lutheran Church. The 2-octave set of bells turned into two 4-octave sets. Kevin is now handbell director at Salem Lutheran Church in Deerwood, Minnesota. The Salem Handbell Choir is a 4-octave choir that is willing to take on challenges given them to expand their ringing experiences.

Kevin works for Rural Minnesota CEP, Inc. at the Brainerd Workforce Center. He is a job counselor for people on the Minnesota Family Investment Program and the Diversionary Work Program.

Why does music sound the way it does?

(For ringers: Session 4a: pitch) The Modes

odes appear often in modern music. Modes were first used in early music, before the Major and Minor scales became the preferred scales (about the time of J. S. Bach). One mode is identical with the Major scale. In today's music this mode is simply called Major. (Ionian = Major)



The remaining modes are called Dorian, Phrygian, Lydian, Mixolydian and Aeolian.

- ✓ Dorian = D, E, F, G, A, B, C, D. D is tonic and half steps are between 2-3 and 6-7.
- ✓ Phrygian = E, F, G, A, B, C, D, E. E is tonic and half steps are between 1-2 and 5-6.
- Lydian = F, G, A, B, C, D, E, F. F is tonic and half steps are between 4-5 and 7-8.
- ✓ Mixolydian = G, A, B, C, D, E, F, G. G is tonic and half steps are between 3-4 and 6-7.
- ✓ Aeolian = A, B, C, D, E, F, G, A. A is tonic and half steps are between 2-3 and 5-6.

Let's consider a Fiddle tune called "Old Joe Clark". This composition uses the pitch "D" as tonic. (Remember the ways to find the tonic pitch? "D" is the last note, it is used more often than any other pitch {13 times}, the pitches "F#" and "A" used next most often outline the Major triad based on "D", "A" begins the melody as part of the chord build on D.) If we spell a scale using the key signature of one sharp and starting on "tonic" of "D", the scale is: D, E, F#, G, A, B, C, D. The half steps are

between F# and G (3 and 4) and B and C (6 and 7). This scale is called Mixolydian. The pitch organization of the composition is "D Mixolydian".

There are two chords used in the composition, D Major (D, F#, A) and C Major (C, E, G). Play them at your next handbell choir rehearsal, or on a piano. The unusual sound of the composition is that of "C". If the scale were called Major it would use a C#. The sound of Mixolydian gives composers a way to write music that has a little different twist, one that brings your attention into the music.

Why does the music sound the way it does?

(For ringers: Session 4b: pitch) The Irregular meter

Now, let's say we rewrite the rhythm of "Old Joe Clark". We can create an arrangement of the composition and then score it for Handbells. I am going to suggest that the meters alternate between 2 and 3 beats per measure.

Once you see the score and realize that there is a pattern to the beats, you might suggest that a meter of 5 beats per measure be used instead of alternating between 2 and 3. This change would put one meter at the beginning of the music and the meter would not need to change. You could still see the intent of the arranger (that there are 2 plus 3 beats per measure) because of how the chords have been arranged. The chords have the name of the chord (D or C) played alone where the accent is intended.


