Fall is the time for... working together

Hello from your Area 7 Board!

The fall "ringing season" is well underway and it is always a very busy time. If your group is like most choirs, you have carefully laid your plans for the season – chosen music that is meaningful and appropriate – counted the number of ringers you expected to have – and set forth with great energy and optimism. THEN – change happened. Maybe a wonderful ringer (or two or more) moved out of town, went back to school, or had a major shift in their availability. Perhaps some adjustments in budget, rehearsal space, or personnel have sent you scrambling. Or some other aspect of your program that you were COUNTING ON did not happen as expected.

Raise your hand if you are in that club – I'm sure there are quite a few in the air! Most choirs have some version of this story to tell at some time. If you are experiencing something like this, please know that you are definitely not alone. The good news is – this detour does not need to derail your program. You have options and there are people in your handbell community who can help you with ideas to stay on track.

Fall is the time for...flexibility. Consider that there are many ways you can meet your goals. If you have too few ringers, could someone cover many bass bells using mallets? Could a bell tree allow a ringer to play multiple bells? Would creative assignments allow fewer ringers to cover more bells? How about bringing in a youth member to fill a position? Would a solo instrument (flute, violin, keyboard) be able to cover a melody line for you, freeing up ringers to play accompaniment parts on bells?

Fall is the time for...reaching out for support. Would teaching 4-in-hand technique to one or more of your choir members help solve your issues – but you don't know how to teach it? Ask nearby choirs to find someone who could teach. Put out your request through social media. Contact your Area 7 Board members to get their assistance.

Fall is the time for...working together. Remember that all of us will need a helping hand at one point or another. Do what you can to sub for another choir when asked or help them find subs as needed. What goes around comes around – let's fill in for each other whenever we can to

continue building a strong, supportive community of handbell musicians.

Thanks for all you do to advance the musical art of handbell ringing. Let your Area 7 Board know if you have questions or if we can assist you in any way.

Don't forget: Mark your calendar now and plan to attend the Area 7 Festival June 19-22 in La Crosse, Wisconsin. It will be an AMAZING event!

Fundraising Ideas

Does your handbell group want to do something fun? Planning to take a trip to Area 7 Festival next June? This is where everyone will have fun, listen to beautiful music, have fun, make beautiful music, have fun, learn new things, have fun, make new friends, see old ones, and have fun!

The problem with the fun is the funds. You need funds for the fun. Registration, hotel, travel, meals...this all adds up. So you need to do some fundraising.

Craft sales and bake sales are common as well as asking for donations. But I hope I can tell you how to put some fun in your fundraising by telling you what the group I ring with has done in the past and continues to do.

- The group's unofficial motto is "will ring for food," so we published a **Handbell Cookbook**. This was a lot of work and took a lot of time. We printed, cut, and bound it ourselves. On some of the pages where we had extra room we put in interesting facts about handbells or other sayings and information about our group. This was so successful we did a second run with added recipes.
- Another time we purchased **T-shirts** for the group with our logo on the front. Then we went to area businesses and asked for a \$20 donation to help us get to the Area 7 Festival. In return for their donation, we had the business name printed on the back. We are in a small town and all the businesses get asked for donations all the time, so we kept the amount low. This worked well. Then we wore the shirts at the festival and at our root beer float concert.
- The Root Beer Float Concert was held outside in the summer at the park one evening. This was a free concert but we sold popcorn and root beer floats to raise money. It was good to play in the summer to keep our skills up and it was another chance to play the music. It's also a good opportunity to play for other people outside of your church. I think when the people hear the bells, they understand better what the fundraising is for. We also put on a **Christmas Concert** every December and take a free-will offering.

One thing I want to point out is to make sure you do some publicity for any performance. This might be a newspaper ad, flyers around town – I ask the local banks to post it on their electronic sign along with the time and temp.

- >> Possibly the best fundraiser we have done is the Ringing Singing Christmas Cards. We take our Christmas ring and sing books and ring and sing for people (kind of like caroling)! We made a form that the buyer fills out including the name, address and telephone number of someone they would like us to ring and sing for. They also get to choose 2 songs from the list on the form (the ones from the books). At the bottom of the form they can write a note to the recipient. We then take the bottom note and attach it to a plate of half-dozen baked goodies and give it to the recipient. We try to do this on a Saturday or Sunday afternoon/evening. We call ahead to make sure the people are home and tell them we have a delivery for them and we will be coming by. We then give them the plate and the note and ring and sing the songs that were requested. This is a simple one to do as it only takes 7 people and they don't even have to read music. We even dress up in Victorian costumes like the carolers in the Christmas Carol.
- The fundraiser that we get asked the most about is our Death by Chocolate annual event that occurs at the beginning of November. We advertise and sell advance tickets and tickets at the door. We are so lucky to have someone that takes charge and gives us orders to get everything done. Each group member is required to make 3 pans of different chocolate items and cut them into 1-inch squares (or there about) and bring them to the event.

About a week before, the entire group gathers and makes some of the items that will keep well like the turkeys, Christmas mice, white mice, and other items. The day of the event we set up and plate all the items – each variety has their own plate which is then placed on tables

with name cards. All the chocolate items are around the perimeter. In the middle there are tables set for 8 people to sit and visit. In one corner we have a chocolate fountain, and in another, different coffees. There is even chocolate punch! It is a good time for people to graze on chocolate and visit. During the event the bell choir plays some music (a few pieces we have ready or think we do) and does some other entertainment/opportunities to raise funds. This

could be a wreath auction, trivia

game, or scavenger hunt. At the end we sell boxes, so they can go around and take treats home with them.

Registrants from throughout Area 7 (and lowa) were eager to note their expectations of the seminar prior to arriving. Tammy addressed each of their concerns and questions during the Seminar in addition to focusing on her Seminar topic: "The Three P's of Performance."

Many attending were seasoned directors, but it was encouraging to hear from a few brand new directors after the event that they felt equipped (and less apprehensive) to start their ringing year. Members of the Area 7 Board volunteered to be mentors to a couple of these new folks, willing to be a local resource and support.

In keeping with Area 7's new policy of having a Service Project at each Area event, "Helping Hands from Handbells" was the theme for this event. Each registrant was asked to bring some items that would benefit displaced women (and families). They donated hand lotion,







gloves, purse-size items, manicure sets, treats, toys, hand sanitizers, and much more.

The Theresa House Shelter in Mankato was selected as the recipient for our gift bags. The Shelter can assist a maximum of 11 families at any given time, however, they must turn away at least 50 (FIFTY) families each MONTH because they do not have any more room. Our goal was to make 11 gift bags, but because of the overwhelming generosity of the Seminar registrants, each gift bag was attached to a fully-filled grocery bag of additional items. Carrol Meyers-Dobler, the Executive Director of Theresa House, gratefully accepted the gift bags and shared several stories of how she and her staff ministers to people each day and how much our gifts will be appreciated.

Composition Class Review

I spent June 30 to July 5, 2013 at Concordia University at the bell composition class led by Dr. John Behnke.

There were 10 of us from the states of California, Florida, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, and Minnesota. This class is only held once every 3 years. Five of the people attending needed this class to finish their Master's Degrees.

We all had to arrange a hymn, and write and arrange an original piece. I arranged a Bill Gaither song, "Something About That Name." My original piece started out as a march and ended up developing into a Spanish piece, called "Companas Viviete," which means "Lively Bells." Many stopped techniques were used to imitate castanets, tambourines, and marimba rolls. Ringers had fun playing it and Dr. Behnke thought it was good enough to present to AGEHR for consideration for publishing.

We had a private lesson each day, with comments on how to improve our writing and arranging skills. In the afternoons we rang each others' work and gave our comments on how the ringers felt ringing it and suggestions on certain areas that might be improved. This went on for 4 days and on the final day we had a concert in the Chapel Church for a small audience. Dr. Behnke was so generous in his comments and help in explaining the best and correct way to arrange bell scores. I learned so much from this experience and am looking forward to the next inspiration to start another composition!

Something New To Try: Table Leg Extenders

and problem solving, and his idea may be something that works for your choir too:

River Bend Bells purchased lightweight folding tables,

which are easy to lift & store but are slightly too short for use as handbell tables. They solved the problem by creating table leg extenders, pictured here. Using lengths of landscape timber (4" x 4" square, cut to 5" height), they drilled a 1½" diameter hole



1½" deep in each section. The table leg fits easily into the wooden extender, providing a sturdy base for the table and bringing it up to the perfect height for ringing.

The Year of the Interval: THIRDS (Session 13)

Answers to August questions about SECONDS: G# to A is a minor second, Ab to Bb a major second, C to D a major second, Eb to F a major second, D to E a major second, and B to C a minor second. Für Elise begins with a minor second, Joy to the World with a minor second, Three Blind Mice a Major second, and Doe, a Deer a Major second. (See Session12 in August issue.) Did you get them right?


This time let's talk about thirds. A whole step contains two half steps. Two whole steps make up a *Major Third* if the letters of the two notes are also three letters apart. Pairs of notes that are major thirds apart are C up to E, D up to F#, E up to G#, F up to A, G up to B, A up to C#, and B up to D#. (Count two whole steps and three letters, i.e., C, D, E.) Why do some of these pairs have a sharp (#) on one of the notes? Without the sharp, the two letters would be 1½ steps apart. They are called *Minor Thirds*: D up to F, E up to G, A up to C, and B up to D. What about the flats? These are all minor thirds: C up to Eb, F up to Ab, G up to Bb; also, minor thirds are found between C# up to E, F# up to A, G# up to B, D# up to F#, etc.

A *Major Third* occurs between the root and third of a Major triad. (See Session 11, April 2013.) This contributes to the strength of the Major triad as a sound. Compositions in Major keys sound strong, noble, positive, triumphant, joyous, etc. (Key type is coupled with dynamics, meter, range and tempo for the complete desired effect.)

A *Minor Third* occurs between the root and third of a minor triad, the distance between tonic and the third of a minor scale. Compositions in minor keys sound soulful, warm, contemplative, introspective, etc. Again together with dynamics, meter, range and tempo the composer can convey the total effect desired. Recognizing the quality of the third is paramount for a true reading of a composition. Where thirds appear in a composition is a key element to tonal music.

Compound Intervals exceed the distance of an octave. C5 up to E6 is a compound major third or a major tenth. C5 up to Eb6 is a compound minor third or a minor tenth. Compound intervals maintain the same qualities (for example: strong vs. soulful) as their Simple (intervals of an octave or less) counterparts, with the sound more expansive.

Can you identify these intervals as major or minor thirds?

A Letter from Area 7's C.H.I.M.E. Program Grant Recipient

The Evansville (WI) Congregational United Church of Christ sincerely thanks the Handbell Musicians of America Area 7 for the opportunity to organize a handbell choir during the 2012-13 school year. The congregation was thrilled to have the bells as part of our worship service. And the ringers enjoyed the beauty - and challenge - of ringing handbells.

I had the privilege of learning the art of handbell ringing from The Guild member Sandra Eithun while I was a member at her church in New London, WI. When I and my family moved to Evansville in 2006, I was disappointed that our new church had no handbells. Then, while visiting with Sandra at a wedding reception in 2012, she told me that the Area 7 CHIME Grant program still had an "unclaimed" set of handbells for the year and she encouraged me to apply on behalf of our church. Our church choir director, Carlie Craig, had some handbell experience and was willing to direct a bell choir for the year, so we applied -

Knowing that our congregation had no prior exposure to handbells, Carlie and I found and received - the grant. four other people to ring a very simple piece on a Sunday in September. This helped us recruit other handbell choir members. We were able to form a choir of 11 members plus 2 substitutes; of that number, only one of the subs had prior handbell experience, but all members had some music experience. Sandra Eithun and her son, Mitchell, presented a 3-hour workshop on handbell techniques which was a great help to our group.

During the year we performed during 12 worship services, with many of those Sundays being during Advent and Lent. Every time we rang, the congregation was very appreciative of the beauty of the bells. There's just something about the sound of bells that has an uplifting effect on all who hear!

We played mostly Level 1 music but did venture into a few more difficult pieces. I'd say the two most difficult challenges were (1) ringing technique, or getting the bell to make a sound when you want it to sound; and (2) counting music to come in at the exact right time. Overall, though - considering this was a new experience for almost everyone in the choir we were quick learners and had some great performances.

Again, thanks so much for your CHIME Grant program that made this experience possible for us. We are truly appreciative.





Even More Fundraising Ideas, to Help You & Your Choir Attend the Festival Conference!

We hope that these ideas, gathered from Area 7 members as well as off of internet sites, will provide the inspiration you need to raise funds for your choir and help everyone attend the Area 7 Handbell Festival in La Crosse WI, June 19-22. We hope to see you there!

Counting On You: Participants guess the quantity of jelly beans, paper clips, marbles, coins, M&Ms, etc. Participants pay to enter the counting contest and the winner gets to keep the jar with the candy.

Night of Dancing: Plan an evening of dancing for just before Valentine's Day. Choose a style of dance – salsa, square dance, line dancing, etc. Hire teachers who will demonstrate and teach. Sell tickets – provide simple snacks and plenty of beverages.

Win A Wine Cellar: Hold an evening of wine tasting and serve some little snacks. The entry fee is \$20 plus a bottle of wine. Everyone who comes gets a raffle ticket, and at the end of the night you raffle off ALL of the wine to one lucky winner.

Root Beer Floats: Sell root beer or Coke floats for \$2. Fairly low cost with a minimal number of volunteers needed.

Sports Days: Have a putt-putt golf tournament, a football skills contest, a basketball shoot out or other sports event. Participants pay an entry fee for the contest.

Super Bowl Party: Sell chili, chips & salsa, other snacks or desserts that people can take to their Super Bowl Parties.

Adult Spelling Bee/ Quiz Bowl/Trivia Bee/ Jeopardy: Host one of these events; sell tickets for participating & viewing.

Cake Auction: Ask people to bake and decorate cakes using a chosen theme, then auction off the cakes.

Bridal Fashion Show:

Ask women to bring in

their bridal gowns & bridesmaid gowns for a style show. Youth group members may serve as "models." Arrange the show in order of the year of the wedding in which that gown was worn. "Wedding bells" theme makes a natural bells fund raiser!

Garage Sale Concessions: My choir sells food at a one-day huge garage sale, with over 150 sales. We sell hot dogs, walking tacos, grapes, donuts, cookies, soda, water, and coffee. The choir gets together the night before to prepare the taco meat and wash & bag the grapes, followed by a choir potluck dinner and social time. Depending on the rules of the community garage sale, a food permit from the State may be required. We have done this sale for the past 25 years and currently average a profit of \$500.





Morna-June Morrow, long-time handbell leader of Winnipeg, Manitoba retires; receives Area 7's first Honorary Lifetime Membership

At the conclusion of the Mother's Day service on May 12, 2013, Westworth United Church, Winnipeg, Manitoba, totally surprised and overwhelmed

Chapel Bells Director, Morna-June Morrow, by giving the premiere performance of "Rejoice in the Dance," an original handbell and handchime composition with oboe or clarinet commissioned from American composer Timothy H. Waugh of Charlotte, NC. The dedication read:

Dedicated to Morna-June Morrow with heartfelt thanks and gratitude for 25 years of devoted and inspired leadership of Westworth United Church Chapel Bells.

At a reception following the service, the following abridged speech was given by Jewel Casselman:

It all started with an article in the *Winnipeg Tribune* in the fall of 1968 about 2 bell choirs in Winnipeg. Morna-June's principal at Oakenwald School asked her if she knew anything about these English bells. M-J had heard the Tec Voc High School bellringers play earlier in the year at the Winnipeg Music Festival and she was intrigued by their sound. Her principal asked if she would be interested in teaching the bells to her elementary students, if the School Division purchased a set of bells. Never backing down from a good challenge and trying something new, Morna-June said that she would love the opportunity.

In March of 1969, a 2-octave set of handbells arrived in Winnipeg from Pennsylvania, packed in individual cardboard boxes like wine bottles, because the school division couldn't afford the cases. She phoned Fred Merrett at Tec Voc High School who already had a set of handbells and went over for a 40-minute crash course in the art of handbell ringing. The rest, as they say, is history.

Always an active learner and educator, Morna-June attended conferences in Kentucky, North Dakota, and Minnesota over the years. By September of 1973, she was totally hooked on handbells and purchased the first 4-octave set of handbells in Manitoba. Years later in 2004, she added a 5-octave set of chimes.

In the fall of 1988, M-J was transferred to Bonnycastle School. Westworth United Church Director of Music, Ruth Wiwchar, said to her, "Have you ever thought of using your bells in a church setting?" A motion was made by the Westworth Board that M-J would direct a handbell group using her own equipment for one year. That "loan" has lasted for a quarter of a century.

In 2003 M-J was awarded the inaugural Manitoba Guild of English Handbell Ringers Trophy at the Winnipeg Music Festival as the most outstanding handbell soloist. This same award was won by the Westworth Chapel Bells in 2007 as the most outstanding handbell choir.

Besides school and church groups, she has directed the University Women's Club Handbell Choir, the Manitoba Handbell Guild Christmas Choir, and the A'Pealing Bells. She formed the All Chim'in Handbell Quartet in 2009 and has played as a handbell soloist since 1998 for the Royal Canadian College of Organists, Winnipeg Girls Choir, Women of Note Choir, St. Benedict's Monastery, Fort Garry Hotel, Pantages Playhouse Theatre, Winnipeg Art Gallery, and at several churches and schools.

M-J is considered one of Canada's leading pioneers in the art of handbell ringing, having given handbell workshops all across Canada and in Minnesota. She has written extensive articles for various music publications provincially, nationally, and internationally. M-J has conducted massed ringing groups across Canada and in 2000, as the National Chair of the Handbell Guilds of Canada, she directed 800 handbell ringers from four continents at an International Handbell Symposium in Birmingham, England. Recently she received this email message from Sandy Mullaney, Chair of Area 7 of the Handbell Musicians of America:

We want you to know how very important you have been to our area. You've generously shared your friendship, leadership, and handbell expertise with countless members of our Area through the years. We cannot thank you enough for going above and beyond to teach, share, answer our questions, serve as a role model and be a wonderful guiding light to our handbell community. We hope that on Sunday you will also share the following with your choir and all of your friends at Westworth.

At its meeting on Saturday, May 4, 2013 the Board of Area 7 Handbell Musicians of America unanimously voted to award Mona-June Morrow the title of Area 7 Honorary Life Member. As our first-ever Life Member, we wish to honor and thank you for all you've given to Area 7.



Clista Wood was a pioneer in the local bell choirs. She established the first youth bell ringers group at North Como Presbyterian Church in Roseville, MN.

Her leadership was important to Area 7. She was extremely organized and kept all of us in line. She would organize ringing events for directors. We would play the sample music that was sent to us and determine if we could use it for our own church choirs. Her focus was on the music and playing for worship services.

Our youth choirs usually attended the Area Festival Conferences and she made sure there were plenty of gettogether events for the youth. She knew lots of games to play with the ringers.

Clista was a marvelous teacher, which was her career. She applied her teaching skills to all levels of bell ringing, too.

She was involved in every aspect of handbells. If we needed to know something, we would say..."let's ask Clista, she'll know." She was the "go-to person."

Her friendship was important to many of us in Area 7. Clista was held in high regard and extended her friendship to all area directors and ringers.

Clista Wood loved people and handbells. In one way or another, Clista left a memorable impression on every individual she met. She heard what you said, and she made you feel important. The scholarship fund attempts to carry on this legacy.

As you can see, Clista was involved with Young Ringers, Directors, and the Festival Conference. How fitting that we should offer scholarships for these events in her name.
