## Harbor Seals and Handbells update: music has been released!

Larlier this year, Twin Cities handbell composers J.C. & J. Irene Harris wrote music as a memorial to the animals lost in a flood at the Lake Superior Zoo. On June 20, 2012, a flash flood in Duluth, MN (which was the site of Area 7's 2012 handbell festival), very seriously damaged the infrastructure of the Lake Superior Zoo, including the habitats for harbor seals and polar bears. Two-thirds of the zoo was consumed by flood waters, some areas remained under water for several days; continued restoration for the grounds is needed.

The music is titled "Lake Superior Prayer," and the composers have committed to giving all of the royalties from the sale of this music to benefit the Lake Superior Zoo. The music is written for 3-5 octave handbell choirs with an



optional C descant instrument. It is a beautiful Level 2 piece, and is especially useful for memorials, Earth Day, and Lent. Strikepoint, a world-class handbell ensemble from Duluth premiered the music in February. There has been much anticipation of the release of this

music from Flagstaff Publications.



"Lake Superior Prayer" is now available for sale! If you were planning to purchase some lovely and accessible handbell music anyway this year, consider looking at music that will not only serve your ensemble and audience, but will also protect animals!

Check with your local handbell retailer to purchase the music for your handbell choir.

## Embracing the "New" ideas

hat's new with you? Has your summer included opportunities to try out new things, travel to new places, embrace new challenges? In addition to some well-deserved rest & relaxation, I hope you've had some new adventures in your summer months, too.

I've just returned from a trip out west with my family — we tried white-water rafting, canyon hiking, and mountain zip-lining. All of these were brand new and more than a bit scary for me! I'm thrilled that I had the chance to try a few different activities, and I'm glad I went ahead with them in spite of my initial jitters. Refreshing!

I encourage you to embrace the "new" in your handbell ringing as well. Challenge yourself to step out of your comfort zone and take on something you haven't tried before:

- ♦ Pick up a solo piece to read through.
- ♦ Try out a bell tree arrangement.
- ♦ Invite a few friends to ring an ensemble together.
- ♦ Take a survey among neighboring choirs, asking them to name their favorite piece from last season then make plans to try it out with your group.
- ♦ Borrow or buy some new percussion instruments add them to pieces for a fresh sound and energy. (Need help? Check with your local high school for a student percussionist who could teach you.)
- Look for some music options in your file and add voices
   narration, soloist, or voice choir to your ringing.

- ◆ Add another element to one of your pieces this year a processional, a slide presentation of inspiring scenes, interpretive movement, sign language, dramatic reading of scripture, or congregational response.
- ♦ Look through handouts from classes you've attended figure out how can you incorporate these ideas in the upcoming year. Forgot some of the details? Contact the clinician to refresh yourself (ask an Area 7 board member for help connecting).

When you try something "new" this year, write up a short article and include a few photos and email it to the Clapper Chatter editor to share your experience with others. We look forward to hearing how adding something new goes for you and your bell choir!

## MUSIC THEORY.aargh®

## The Year of the Interval: SECONDS (Session 12)

Bells are assigned to ringers in adjacent pairs of notes called *seconds*. Most of these pairs are a *whole step* apart, and one is a *half step* apart. D to E, F to G, A to B are *whole steps*, B to C is a half step. Each of these pairs contains two different letters and are therefore called *seconds*.

A whole step contains two half steps. The pairs of notes that are whole steps apart have a black piano keyboard note between them. If you count half steps D to E are two half steps apart or a *major second*. Two adjacent white keys on the keyboard are E to F. E to F is one half step apart or a *minor second*.

A major second contains two adjacent letters in the musical alphabet and two half steps. D to E, F to G, A to B are major seconds. A minor second contains two adjacent letters in the musical alphabet and one half step. A minor second is found between E and F. If we consider the sharps and flats, there are more major and minor seconds available. These intervals are major seconds: B to C#, E to F#, Bb to C, Ab to Bb, and so on. These intervals are minor seconds: F to Gb, A to Bb, D# to E, and so on. (The intervals from F to F#, A to A#, Eb to E are not minor seconds. These intervals contain only one letter in the musical alphabet.)

Intervals can be performed *melodically* or *harmonically*. As their names suggest, in *melodic intervals* the notes follow one another as in a melody, in *harmonic intervals* the notes are performed simultaneously.

Intervals are called *diatonic* or *chromatic*. *Diatonic intervals* are those that belong to a given major scale key signature. (In the key of C Major: B to C, D to E, F to G, and A to B are all *diatonic intervals*.) *Chromatic intervals* occur between notes belonging to the major scale key signature and other notes. (In the key of C Major: B to C#, D to Eb, F# to G, and so on are all *chromatic intervals*.)

These are all terms musicians use to easily converse with one another. They are also terms used to identify the function of the interval within a given context.

In the Music Theory column this season, we will explore all the intervals and other facets of their use. In the meantime, can you identify these intervals as *major* or *minor seconds*?



Seconds begin these well-known compositions: Are they major or minor seconds?

• Für Elise by Beethoven

- Joy to the World melody by Handel
- Three Blind Mice English nursery rhyme
- Doe, a Deer by Richard Rodgers

# A Letter from Area 7's C.H.I.M.E. Program Grant Recipient

In the spring of 2012, I applied for and received a grant to use a 3-octave set of handbells for our school, Woodcrest Baptist Academy. I had previously taught handbells at a school in PA and knew they would be a great asset to the music program of this school.

We offered handbells at the Junior and Senior High levels. Because of the number of students involved, we were able to divide into 4 handbell choirs, 2 for each level. The students immediately fell in love with handbells and were eager to learn. Students who previously had shown no excitement for music were now becoming involved and loving it.

Our first performance at school was at the Christmas concert. Needless to say, parents and friends of the school were captivated by the student involvement and the quality of sound in such a short amount of practice time. All four handbell choirs played.

Next, the Senior High handbell choirs participated in the MN Association of Christian Schools State Competition. Although the choirs did not place, the judges commented positively on the skill levels and the abilities of the students' performances.

The last performance for the handbell choirs took place at our Spring Concert in May. Once again, all four handbell choirs participated. The improvement and techniques exhibited were a testament to the students' love of the handbells. What a great opportunity afforded to us, for which we are very grateful! We spent the rest of the school year working on handbell skills. Our Jr.

High groups went to a local nursing home to play handbells and sing in May. The Sr. High groups mentored 5th and 6th graders learning to ring.

Our church, Woodcrest Baptist Church, also benefited from the handbells as we formed a church handbell choir that was able to play special music in one of our church services every other month. We already had several experienced handbell players in church and then added to that group to form the choir. Every time they played in church you could have heard a pin drop as

Due to overwhelming enthusiasm for the bell program, we began to collect funds to purchase our own set of handbells with free-will offerings at both school concerts. Our school also held they were so enjoyed. a rummage sale to raise funds, along with a pledge program to help pay for bells. And I'm happy to say, funds have been fully raised to purchase a new 3-octave set.

Thank you so much for your vision of getting handbells into the hands of organizations that need that little extra help to get a program started. We are looking forward to

having Bill Mathis in the fall of 2013 and are excited to see what the future holds!

### Clista Wood Scholarship Fund

The Clista Wood Scholarship Fund was established to provide encouragement and assistance to eligible individuals to attend an Area 7 ringing event. One Scholarship is awarded per event: Festival Conference, Directors Seminar, and Young Ringers Camp.

The scholarship will be awarded as a reimbursement and will be presented to the recipient during the event. Applicants must be a full Handbell Musicians of America member, affiliated with a recognized member organization, or participate in a group directed by a full Handbell Musicians of America member. Applicants must describe their desire to attend and indicate how they will share the knowledge they have gained. Applicants must include contact information of another full Guild member that we may contact to receive a statement of recommendation.

#### Festival Conference (FC) (held in even years)

- Application deadline for FC is May 1, of the corresponding year.
- The scholarship will cover the full cost of registration (housing excluded).

#### **Directors Seminar (DS)** (held in odd years)

- Deadline for the DS application is September 1, of the corresponding year.
- The scholarship will cover the full cost of registration (housing excluded).

#### Young Ringers Camp (YRC) (held in odd years)

- Scholarship will be awarded to a participating choir/director attending the Area 7 Young Ringers Camp.
- Deadline for the YRC application is April 15th, of the corresponding year.
- The scholarship amount will be the full cost of one camper registration fee (includes registration, housing, and meals).
- The director may decide how this scholarship is used, such as toward part of their choir's registration fees, music purchase, or travel expenses.
