## MUSIC THEORY.aargh@

### Accidentals - 2 (Session 25) For Harmonic Reasons: More Secondary Dominants

In Session 24 (August 2016) we talked about **accidentals** used for **harmonic** reasons and specifically focused on the Dominant that leads to the Dominant, a **Secondary Dominant** (not the dominant that belongs to the key signature, the Primary Dominant.) Key factors in any dominant are that there is a pitch a half step away from its tonic (**a leading tone**) and that the chord progression is of a descending fifth, or counterclockwise around the circle of fifths. (See sessions 22 and 23)

One other factor involved in the progression of a dominant seventh chord to its tonic is that there is a **tritone** in the dominant seventh chord. A tritone is either a **diminished fifth** or an **augmented fourth** (see session 15). This interval has a long history of being described as "**diabolus in musica**" (the devil is music) because of its **instability**. The interval happens (among other places) between the 4<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> scale degrees of a major scale. Play F and B on the bells or piano and you will hear what I mean. The B wants to resolve to C and the F to E. Use a tritone and you instill urgency in the resolution of a chord! Go, Go, Go!!!

Secondary Dominant seventh chords can be seen in the Beethoven hymn "Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee." Two important accidentals are a **lowered 7th scale degree** and a **raised 5th scale degree**. (It also uses the raised 4th, but you know that chord, see session 24.)



At the Festival in Sioux Falls in June, 2016 the massed choir played **Hymn to Joy** based on the hymn by Beethoven and arranged for handbells by Michael Keller, Hope HP 1457. Look at measures 17-18, 23-24, and 24 beats two to three to find these chords. What did these chords do to the music? How will you treat these measures in performance? Where are these measures in the hymn tune? What are the words at this point? Why did Beethoven harmonize with the chromatic pitches? (He could have used pitches belonging to the scale, diatonic, not chromatic, pitches.) Is there an urgency of forward motion required in performance?

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Healthy, Musical Ringing Article 5

## Silence is Golden

No sound is as important as sound, it gives the ears a rest and the heart a chance to process.

How is the tennis ball ringing going? If you missed this reference, check out the previous Healthy, Happy Ringing articles that covered stretching, stance, seating and ringing the bell. We now have sound so let's learn about stopping the sound. In the bell world the most common stopping of sound is referred to as "damping the bell". Trust me, this does not have anything to do with moisture.

Check this out. Pick up a bell lower than C6 and ring it. While holding it straight up and down in front of you, poke the end of a finger into the side of the bell and hold it there. Do you still hear sound? Do it again and try another spot. Do you still hear sound? Hopefully your answer is yes.

Most of us have been told, the sound comes off the lip of the bell. While this may be true, the sound is made by vibration of the entire bell casting. Your finger poking one spot only stops the sound production for that part of the bell. So the lesson here is that to stop the sound of the bell, you need to damp more than just one spot, more than the lip. With the little bells this is easy as there is just not too much bell to worry about. However, the bigger the bell the more surface we need to damp.

I will get to the "how" in a second but first I want to remind you to check for buttons, jewelry, zippers, beading or anything else on your clothing that could damage the bell or interfere with your damping.

There are a variety of ways to damp that are safe for you and the bell. You may finger damp, table damp or body damp to name a few. How you damp may depend on the size of the bell, your body style, bell transitions and more. The important thing is to stop the sound while protecting your body and the bell.

I'll save finger damping and table damping for a future article and focus in on body damping as it applies to the most common situations. Use healthy, happy ringing technique to ring your bell (use previous articles for reference). To damp the bell on your body, pull your elbow back until the entire metal part of the bell (the casting) comfortably touches your body. Remember: the more of the bell casting that touches, the more completely the sound will be stopped. Some people are more comfortable damping in the upper chest area and some in the abdomen area. There is no right or wrong place to body damp but the keys are to pull the elbow back to minimize the wrist bending you are doing and damp the entire casting. This will minimize the stress on your wrist, elbow and shoulder while stopping the sound. Try a variety of positions while minimizing your wrist motion. Once you've found a comfortable spot, try a bell an octave higher or lower and see if the same body placement is comfortable.

Some of you may have seen a t-shirt that says: "To Damp or Not to Damp, When is the Question." Generally, we are working for a legato line where there are no breaks in the sound between notes. The sound should flow from one note to the next. To accomplish this, ring the full note value and damp on the following note or rest. For example, in 4/4 if you are ringing a half note that starts on beat one, full count is 2 full beats so you would damp as the bells on beat 3 ring. Remember if the bell is to ring again right after the full note value, don't damp but simply ring again.
