New Board Member: Meet Steve Meyer!

Steve Meyer—Southern Minnesota Sub-Area Chair

I am a graduate of SMSU, Marshall, MN, with a degree in K - 12 vocal music & elementary/ middle school classroom music education. I have 2 adult children. My daughter Stephanie and her husband Andy live in Mounds View, MN & my son Anthony and his wife RaeAnn live in Plymouth, MN.

I am a member of First Lutheran Church in Marshall, MN, singing in the Chancel Choir since 1985. In 1988 I was asked to be the inaugural director of the handbell choir at First Lutheran Church which I led for several years. After taking a few years off, in 1998 I took over the role of handbell choir (Spirit Bells) director again. Singing in a quartet and a global music influenced worship leadership group round out the list of my music activities at First Lutheran Church.

I helped start JuBELLant Celebration along with the directors of two community churches: Rennae Petersen, the director of Ecumenibells (sponsored by Cornerstone United Methodist Church) and Jean Schueller, RING (Ring In the Name of God) from The Church of the Holy Redeemer. This April (2016) will be the 12th year. Initially we wanted to provide an



opportunity for bell choirs in southwest Minnesota to have a learning environment and have the ability to share individual talents that culminated in a mass concert at the end of the day. However, due to the shrinking number of ringers in the area, the last several years of JuBELLant Celebration have been a community concert put on by just the Spirit Bells, RING & Ecumenibells.

I am actively involved in a variety of music ensembles in and around the Marshall area. I play trumpet in the Marshall Community Band and SMO (Southwest Minnesota Orchestra) at SMSU. I also sing with the Prairie Arts Chorale (an auditioned vocal ensemble made up of singers of southwestern Minnesota). I have spent most of the past 15 summers playing in the pit orchestra for the Marshall Area Stage Company's summer musicals. This past summer I was honored to be the Bishop in our community production of Les Miserable. Harmony - 3 (Session 23) "Harmonic Progression around the Circle of Fifths"



Remember 3, 6, 2, 5, 1 or E, A, D, G, C? (See above chart.) These are Perfect Fifths in a counterclockwise order around the Circle of Fifths. Think of the circle as a clock. If you move from 1 o'clock to 12 o'clock (G to C) that distance is a descending Perfect Fifth. If G is dominant, C is its tonic. Also, D is the dominant of G, and A is the dominant of D. (You move in counterclockwise descending motion.) And the same is true all around the circle.

If you move in clockwise motion (11 o'clock to 12 o'clock) you have a motion of a descending Perfect Fourth. F is the Subdominant on C Major.

Any three adjacent tones in the circle give you the subdominant, tonic and dominant of a key. For example, if you read 12 o'clock to 1 o'clock to 2 o'clock this is in order, the subdominant, tonic and dominant in the key of the middle number, or in this case, G.



These are the important chords in stressing tonality. Why is this important to me? I know as a conductor/ringer that when these chords are adjacent, the structure of the composition is in an important place. Often this structure is paired with a dynamic level change, a tempo change, a range change, or any of many other elements in a composition. It is the goal of the composition to reach tonic at critical sectional changes and endings and therefore gives purpose to the altering of steady pulse, loudness, etc., of the composition.

Best Seat in the House

Past articles taught stretching and a strong ringing stance. This article introduces how the bell is seated in your hand so you are ready to ring.

Begin with thumb and fingers pointing forward. Think of how Lego hands look. Align thumb, wrist, forearm, elbow, upper arm and shoulder – no chicken wings. Your forearm is parallel to the ground. Relax your wrist in a neutral position aligning your pinkie finger with bottom of your forearm as if your hand and arm were resting on a table.

The bell's hand guard (round plastic piece between the handle and the metal) will sit in the "U" formed by your thumb and index finger. Close your index finger around the bell handle to touch the thumb creating a "circle of control". The other three fingers are not required to hold the bell. The bell is now properly seated in the circle of control.

Don't grab, hold, grip, grasp, clutch or seize your bells. Relax and let the bell balance on the circle of control. Remember your surfboard stance and Lego hands and arms. Relax, take a breath and smile, you are ready to ring.



Anthornis Central Service Project Benefits PRISM

The 2016 Anthornis Central event was a success in so many ways: we enjoyed great attendance with over 80 ringers, we grew as musicians under Michael Helman's skillful direction, we had a wonderful time connecting with friends and we offered a wonderful closing concert to cap off the weekend.

In addition to all of these great aspects, Anthornis Central was also successful in reaching out with "Helping Hands From Handbells" to people in our community who need support. The Anthornis Central Service Project benefitted the local non-profit organization PRISM (People Reaching out In Social Ministry). Attendees were invited to bring shelf stable items including breakfast food and baby food/items as donations to PRISM's Marketplace Shelves.

There was strong support for this project – as a group, we donated 90 pounds of food, 8 pounds of "non-food" (diapers, baby wipes) and \$160 in cash donations. The PRISM staff was thrilled to receive the donations and several volunteers told us that our timing was perfect – they often have emptier food shelves in the month of February and many in the community are experiencing great need this winter.

New Choir Formed Through Friendship and Fellowship

While cooperation is one of the hallmarks of handbell ensembles, it's rare to have the chance to help an entirely new group get started in the fellowship of bell ringers. This fall, Bells of the Bluffs (BOB), based in Red Wing, Minnesota, had precisely that opportunity when they partnered with a brand-new handbell ensemble at St. Philip's Lutheran Church in nearby Hastings.

Through a long-term friendship between Marilee Anderson, BOB Musical Director, and Ellen Diischer, Music Director at St. Philip's, a mentoring relationship began with the St. Philip's congregation raising enough funds in just three months to purchase three octaves of bells to augment the church's chimes program. Sharing equipment, tips and techniques with BOB, the St. Philip's ringers quickly took their new instruments and performed in worship for the first time in early December. The two groups also shared the stage at a concert in late February in a fulllength concert at St. Philip's.


