Performance - 4 (Session 31) Every Rehearsal is a Performance: Rhythm

How do I ensure that the performance of a piece written for handbell choir creates the sound that the composer intended?

The composer's most straightforward indicators are those of tempo, dynamic and articulation as we discussed in Session 28. The composer's score notation also tells us about the melody (Session 29), **rhythm**, harmony (Session 30), texture, tone color and form.

Rhythm is probably the historical beginning of music. The beating of patterns of sound imitated natural sounds. Notation of rhythmic sound began to occur, but it took many centuries for our current system of notation of rhythm to evolve. Notation of rhythm as we have now works, but it is also changing in a way similar to language changes. Rhythmic notation is based on the recurrence of strong and weak beats and their divisions and multiples. This column has previously addressed **rhythm**; see sessions 2b, 3b, 7, and 9.

Other terms related to rhythm are beat, pulse, measure, tempo and meter. **Beat** refers to the basic unit of time. The beat is often what we tap when listening to a piece of music. **Pulse** refers to the regular repeat of the beat, like, hopefully, your own pulse. **Measure** simply gives us a way to organize the beats. **Tempo** relates to the speed (fast, slow, or in-between) or pace of a given composition. **Meter** is the recurrent rhythmical pattern of note values, accents, and beats per measure.

When a composition is given a **Meter Signature**, or **Time Signature** (interchangeable words) the composer is telling us how the beats have been organized. There is a hierarchy of beats, not all are equal. Some beats are more accented than others; some parts of beats are more accented than others (strong and weak beats). These "accents" are part of the metric organization, not the special added notational markings sometimes used. First beats of the measure are accented more than the rest of the beats; this is part of the plan when using a meter signature. Downbeats are always more accented than upbeats; this is also part of the plan when using a meter signature. If all beats are to be equally accented, there should be no bar lines and no beats of longer duration than others. Well, it would become very robotic without some accent, and therefore the system of metric organization evolved.

There are three main systems of **meters: Simple** Meters, **Compound** Meters, and **Complex** or **Asymmetrical** Meters. Simple meters have upper numbers of 2, 3, or 4; compound meters have upper numbers of 6, 9, or 12. Complex or asymmetrical meters have are the rest of the upper numbers; 5, 7, 8, 10, 11, 13, etc.

Can you find beats in the composition that are more accented than other beats because of their placement in the measure? Even without special accents first beats and downbeats are more stressed than all the rest of the beats (strong and weak beats). It is the composer's intention for those beats (including the pitch and harmony) to be more stressed.

The next series of articles will deal with each of the meter signatures. What we want to know is, why is a triplet notated in a simple meter with a special sign? And, why is a duplet notated in a compound meter with a special sign?

In the meantime remember, 2 against 3 is "not dif-fi-cult"! (Thanks to the rehearsals for Anthornis with Alanna's orphan choir.) I hope to see you at the 2018 Festival Conference in Rochester, MN, June 22-24.

Proposed By-Laws will be on the Ballot

Handbell Musicians of America consists of twelve geographical areas each with its own board and membership. Area 7 includes Minnesota, Wisconsin, North Dakota, South Dakota and Manitoba. Each of these twelve areas is unique in how they implement our common mission: "Handbell Musicians of America is dedicated to advancing the musical art of handbell/handchime ringing through education, community and communication." and our vision: "Uniting people to create a diverse community in which handbell musicians of every skill level realize their full potential through a musically-respected art form."

While our programming may vary greatly, the National Board has recognized that this does not mean our governances should be that varied. To this end, the National Board created a set of model by-laws that they have asked each area to adopt. Area 7 started this process over 3 years ago. Two of our former chairs sat down with our current by-laws and the model by-laws to work through the differences. They presented potential modifications to the Area 7 board. The board discussed the proposed changes and made further clarifications and modifications. After a few iterations, we sent them to the National Board for their approval, as is required. We have gone through several iterations between the National Board and the Area 7 Board and have reached a set of by-laws that were approved by the Area 7 board and the National Board to put before the Area 7 membership for approval.

The By-laws of Area 7 govern and guide the Area 7 board and members regarding how we conduct the business of our organization. The current by-laws are available on the Area 7 website at the bottom of the "About the Guild" page. The proposed by-laws can also be viewed here: https://goo.gi/2/wikaN

In addition to voting for the elected officers of the Area 7 Board, the 2018 ballot will include a question regarding the adoption of the proposed by-laws. Please review the proposed by-laws and be prepared to vote on this issue.

Encouraging New Ringers

Spring is just around the corner, but still hiding out under the snow in most of Area 7! Many handbell choirs are getting ready for their spring concerts, or planning on their final worship services before breaking for the summer months. But, did you ever think to use those summer months for antagonizing...uhm, encouraging new ringers?

If you are in a church setting why not designate one Sunday each month for an "all-church ring"? This is where you hand out a bell or chime with the appropriate hymn or chorus that goes with it. Highlight the word(s) where that bell/chime rings and let your "volunteered" participant ring during that song. This works with almost any age group that can read words. Sometimes several family members will all have the same note, just different octaves, and can ring together. Reminding people that no one else knows which notes they have and won't know if they miss a note or two tends to take the worry factor away. Besides, if they miss their notes on the first verse they always have another chance to get them on the following verses!

Another method to bring in new ringers is by introducing those colorful little Melody Bells into these "all-church rings". Put them into the mix along with the rest of the bells and chimes and let everyone see how much fun they can have accompanying the worship songs. Additionally you could start a children's group for the Melody Bells using those little chord charts that show the colors of the bells that need to ring. This gets the younger ones interested in making music and allows you ample opportunity to introduce note reading along the way.

These two methods are great ways to introduce an entirely new group to our handbell passion and get them interested in learning more about this musical instrument. Starting now and continuing throughout the summer months, even one a month, will definitely help you grow your bell groups in the fall. Go forth and multiply!


