OCTOBER 13TH WORKSHOP GIVEN BY MONICA S. MCGOWAN

Twenty members of the Manitoba Guild of English Handbell Ringers attended the all-day workshop at Faith Lutheran Church in the St. Vital area of Winnipeg on Saturday, October 13th. Our guest clinician was Monica S. McGowan of Custer, South Dakota.



Monica S. McGowan took her music education background – Bachelor of Science, Music Education, Chadron State College, Nebraska – and found her life's passion in handbells. She is the consummate handbell musician: accomplished ringer, seasoned director, internationally recognized clinician and Master Technician. During her tenure as the founding Artistic and Music Director of Twin Cities Bronze, Minneapolis-St. Paul, Minnesota, she led the ensemble to recognition as an internationally acclaimed handbell ensemble known for its professional musical artistry. In 2017, Monica was named the Artistic and Music Director for Bells of the Hills in Rapid City, South Dakota.

As the Handbell Coordinator for the International Music Camp Summer School of Fine Arts held at the International Peace Gardens, she serves as faculty for Handbell Week and Handbells at Adult Camp. She opened her business, *Ringing Restorations*, in January 2004 and through her work in the repair, maintenance and refurbishment of handbells and handchimes, has achieved the title of distinction: Master Technician.

Monica brought her extensive training, passion, love, enthusiasm and knowledge for handbells and handchimes by providing a challenging, successful and fun experience for our participants.

SESSION ONE: Situational Awareness

To be aware of all that is around you, mindful of elements as they relate to time and space, factors that allow the team to function effectively and how one's own actions impact results are descriptors in the definition of "situational awareness." As handbell musicians, whether director or ringer, mastering situational awareness can minimize "human error," allow one to take in more information, master complex tasks and help you and the team "function" more effectively. Discover the OODA Loop (Observe, Orient, Decide, Act), Condition Yellow (Relaxed Alert), Focus Lock and Reticular Activating System were explored in great detail. By discovering the tools in "situational awareness" that will help you become a more successful handbell musician.

Handbell Guilds of Canada Report was given by National Chair, Patsy Andrews-Vert

The Handbell Guilds of Canada has been continuously working on the new Governance Documents. I can tell you that we have passed 2 government hurdles and are now working on the third one. This has been a 10+ year project, but we are feeling some satisfaction finally. There will be more information out once we complete the government requirements.

This past summer was the International Handbell Symposium in Cairns, Australia. There were about 450 registered in the 3 strands at the festival, with 301 being registered for the actual symposium. Australia held the inaugural International Handchime Festival and a Youth Symposium as well. The level of playing was again amazing and the symposium was very well organized and thoroughly enjoyed by everyone in attendance. There were 14 ringers from Canada as well as 2 non-ringing delegates. My husband Ron Vert and I represented Manitoba in the Canadian delegation. While in Cairns, I had the privilege of being able to nominate and present, on behalf of the Handbell Guilds of Canada and then the International Handbell Committee, the International Handbell Laureate Award to Carmel Daveson from the Handbell Society of Australasia. This was an honour for Canada and very humbling for the very deserving Carmel Daveson.

Ringing in Australia and snorkeling in the Great Barrier Reef and the Coral Sea was an exciting adventure. What an opportunity I have been afforded by this love of Handbell Ringing.

SESSION TWO: Annotations and Articulations

Handbells, by their nature, are a percussive as well as a melodic instrument. To bridge these percussive and melodic components, a variety of techniques have been invented and modified over the years. As in all techniques with any musical instrument, there are correct and safe ways in which to execute them. Methods, when taught without regard to cause and effect or carelessly executed, can damage not only the "instrument" but the individual as well. The standardized symbols, created by the Handbell Musicians of America and adopted by the music publishers was given in the handout. The execution of stopped techniques and other articulations were demonstrated, with consideration given to the manufacturers' recommendations. Class participants discovered the "secrets" to attain successful responses and consistent sounds for articulations found in today's repertoire. Hand chimes were also discussed briefly.



Judging from comments made by the participants, everyone agreed that they learned so much from the many aspects of Monica's workshop offerings. Thank you, Monica, for your gainful insight into the fascinating world of handbell ringing from your Friendly Manitoba neighbours north of the 49th parallel!

PURPOSE: To promote the composition and arrangement of music for handbells by Canadians, and in the process select the Canadian piece of handbell music which will be used as the Canadian Massed Ringing item at the 19th International Handbell Symposium (IHS) in Hong Kong in 2020.

PRIZE: A \$1000.00 prize will be awarded to the composer of the successful manuscript.

GENERAL INFORMATION: International Handbell Symposia are held every two years, and attract some of the top handbell choirs in the United States, Canada, Japan, the United Kingdom, Australasia, Korea, Hong Kong and Singapore. Pieces are chosen from each country, and are rung "en masse" by all participants. The average ringer attendance ranges between 900 and 1200 ringers. Some teams or choirs ring three chromatic octaves of bells which range upwards from the C4, the C below middle C. Most attending choirs ring 5 octaves of bells, which range up from C3, the C two octaves below middle C. Several choirs have the sixth (or even seventh) octave from the G below to the G above that.

RULES AND COMPETITION CONDITIONS

- 1. Entries must be an **arrangement** of **Canadian Folk Song(s)** in any style, to be written in the handbell idiom. It is the sole responsibility of arrangers to obtain written permission from copyright holders or to determine that the Folk Song is in the public domain before proceeding with the writing of the handbell arrangement
- 2. Entries must be suitable for massed ringing and useable by 3, 4, 5, and perhaps 6 octave choirs in a single choir setting.
- 3. Entries must be unpublished and not submitted to another contest or to a publisher for publication during the term of this competition.
- 4. The composition should be three (3) to five (5) minutes in length.
- 5. Range of difficulty should be medium to medium-difficult, or level 3 to 4+, according to the HMA rating system. Recognized handbell notation must be used. (The latest issue of <u>Handbell Notation and Grading</u> is available from the Handbell Musicians of America, 1-800-878-5459. Provincial Guilds can also be of service.)
- 6. Adjudication will be based on the following criteria: 1. Appeal to ringers and audience, 2. Effectiveness as a handbell composition, 3. Suitability for massed ringing, 4. Probability of acceptance for publication and 5. Overall emotional, intellectual and musical impression.
- 7. Eight copies without the name of the composer/arranger, and one copy with the name of the composer/arranger must be sent to the Chairman along with the completed and signed entry form. Each copy must be submitted in its own separate envelope. DO NOT SEND THE ORIGINAL COPY. All copies will be destroyed at the end of the contest unless the composer wishes them returned at his or her own cost.
- 8. An electronic file recording may also be sent to patavert@gmail.com in order to facilitate a listening of the composition.
- 9. The composer/arranger may enter as many manuscripts as he or she wishes. A separate entry form is required with each manuscript.
- 10. The composer/arranger's permission is required with their entry for individual judges to duplicate a manuscript solely for the purpose of sight reading with a handbell choir for adjudication purposes. After such single reading, the copies will be immediately destroyed. Without such permission, adjudication will be based purely on the manuscript.
- 11. The Handbell Guilds of Canada reserve the right to guide the successful winners towards timely publication of the manuscript.
- 12. Entrants must be Canadian citizens.

CANADIAN MUSIC EDUCATORS ASSOCIATION BUILDERS AWARD

During the Manitoba Music Educators Association TEMPO provincial music workshops on Friday, October 19th, at the Mennonite Brethren Collegiate in Elmwood, MMEA President Karen Tole-Henderson presented the Canadian Music Educators Association Builders Award for 2018 to Morna-June Morrow in honour of her 55 year career as a music educator. Following is the speech Karen gave during the presentation.

MORNA - JUNE MORROW ARCT, AMM, B.Mus., B.Ed., M.Ed, Orff Cert.

A retired music specialist/supervisor in the public school system, Morna-June Morrow has directed vocal and handbell choirs, recorder and Orff groups, accompanied many choirs, and adjudicated music festivals across western Canada. She served on MMEA Executives in several positions from 1963-1976 including Editor of the *Manitoba Music Educator* and a contributing editor to CMEA; has written historical documents on the Wednesday Morning Musicale, the Manitoba Guild of English Handbell Ringers, and co-authored two books for the 40th anniversary of Carl Orff Canada's Music for Children, Musique pour enfants in 2014.

She was Music Supervisor in Fort Garry School Division in the 1970's and was Founding President of the Manitoba Orff Chapter in 1975, and served as National Carl Orff Canada President. In 1985 she presented a paper on the history of "Orff-Schulwerk in Canada" at the International Orff Symposium in Salzburg, Austria. Morna-June was the first music educator in western Canada to receive an Honorary Life Membership in Carl Orff Canada in 1994. She was nominated for the Canadian College of Teachers Encyclopedia Britannica Award in 1982, the Manitoba Lieutenant-Governor's Elementary Classroom Teacher Award in 1996 and the YWCA Women of Distinction Award in 2006. Upon her retirement 20 years ago, the Manitoba Orff Chapter established the "Morna-June Morrow Award for Excellence in Music Education in Manitoba".

M-J served as President of several music organizations including that as President of the Winnipeg Music Festival Board of Directors and National Chair of the Handbell Guilds of Canada. In 2000 she was the Canadian conductor at the International Handbell Symposium in Birmingham, England, where she conducted 800 bell ringers from ten countries on four continents. Morna-June was the Federation of Canadian Music Festivals 2013 National Volunteer of the Year in Manitoba.

Heavily involved with handbell ringing for the past 49 years, M-J served as an international conductor at massed ringing conferences and as a workshop clinician in England, Minnesota, North Dakota and all across Canada. She is an Honorary Life Member of the Handbell Musicians of America Area VII and the Manitoba Guild of English

Handbell Ringers. Morna-June currently serves as Archivist, Editor and Membership-Treasurer of the Manitoba Handbell Guild and rings in five handbell ensembles. But retirement is not a word she has yet found meaning for, as tomorrow she will become Vice President at the AGM of the *Associated Manitoba Arts Festivals*.

It gives me great pleasure as President of MMEA to announce that the Manitoba Music Educators Association nominated Morna-June Morrow for the Canadian Music Educators National Builders Award for 2018 in honour of her 55 years as a dedicated music educator in our province, across Canada and internationally. Congratulations!
