PROLOGUE

The Manitoba Handbell Guild hosted the 2002 National Conference for the Handbell Guilds of Canada and titled it "CHRISTMAS IN JULY". It was so successful that when Manitoba was asked to host the 2014 National Conference we decided to present a Christmas encore featuring Charles Dickens' "A CHRISTMAS CAROL". The Spirits of the Past, Present and Future, became the Music of the past, of the present which in this case was 19th century Victorian Era, and music yet to come – 20th and 21st centuries. The conference was titled, "A DICKENS OF A RING".

Morna-June Morrow asked Stuart Sladden to form a group of handbell ringers to perform during the banquet at that conference. We did so, rehearsing on Rochester Avenue and thus we became known as the Rochester Ringers. It was rather ironical when we discovered that the Charles Dickens' Centre Museum is located in Rochester, England, so our name really has two places associated with the name Rochester. That was the only time the Rochester Ringers rang because Stuart was off to Edmonton to work on his Doctorate of Choral Conducting.


When Stuart returned to Winnipeg he wondered if the Rochester Ringers could reconvene. Because our initial appearance was connected with Charles Dickens, and the fact that Ebenezer Scrooge was once engaged to a lady called "Belle", why not mount a production with OUR "belles" and chimes.

Charles Dickens' "A CHRISTMAS CAROL" was written 176 years ago this month. Dickens himself declared it was his favourite story. Charles Dickens started working on what he called his "little Christmas book" in mid-October 1843 and had 6000 copies published on December 19, 1843. By Christmas Eve they were all sold out. "A Christmas Carol" has never gone out of print, and has spawn hundreds of plays, readings, TV shows and movies starring everyone from Alastair Sim, George C. Scott and Canadians Christopher Plummer and Jim Carrey, even Scrooge McDuck and the Muppets.

As Dickens told his friends, the tale of Scrooge's journey to redemption took shape during his nightly long walks through London. He'd look in people's windows and see families like the Cratchits gathered around a table or a hearth. The names of his characters came from the people he met on his walks. Tiny Tim was based on the sickly son of his sister, Fanny.

So please sit back and enjoy PJ Buchan's reading and the Rochester Ringers presentation of Charles Dickens "A Christmas Carol".

Editor's Note: It was 40 years ago that I travelled with the Bass Clef Chorus and Better Half Singers of Winnipeg to the Holy Land during the 1979 Christmas season. They performed two concerts in Jerusalem with other choirs and did a solo program in Tel Aviv, but without a doubt, the most impressive program was on Christmas Eve in Bethlehem's Manger Square, outside the Church of the Nativity. Imagine 10,000 people squeezed into the Square to hear choirs from around the world singing. When it was announced that a handbell ringing group from Nazareth would be performing, I wondered what handbells they would be using. Right on! Schulmerich Handbells made in Pennsylvania, the same set I purchased in 1973. Most MBGEHR members also use Schulmerich handbells.
