### **Board Notes**

The Handbell Musicians of America organization celebrated New Year on October 1. This may seem a bit early, but October 1 is the beginning of the new fiscal year for HMA as well as the transition date for area leadership. In Area 7 we welcomed three new Board members: Jordan Goodwater (Northern Minnesota Sub Area Chair), Chad Winterfeldt (Southern Minnesota Sub Area Chair), and Stacey Nordmeyer (Southern Wisconsin Sub Area Chair). We are so fortunate that they said "yes" when asked to serve, and we look forward to working with them over the next two years.

In July the **HMA National Seminar** had two options for participants: an in-person event in Glendale-Phoenix, Arizona or a virtual component. While there's nothing like being in person, having virtual access to classes and concerts is an excellent option for the membership.

As the newly appointed Sub Area Chair for Northern Wisconsin, I look forward to getting to know members and helping with membership renewals, recruitment of members, working at events, and encouraging members to participate in handbell activities. I'm looking forward to being more involved in HMA.

I have been directing the handbell choir at the University of Wisconsin Oshkosh (UWO) for about 15 years. I also teach a variety of music and music education courses. Prior to university teaching, I was a public school teacher in Ohio where I taught 5-12 band and K-6 general music. My graduate degrees are in music education and conducting. I started ringing during my master's degree program when a graduate student offered a handbell methods course. I was hooked! We don't have enough bells to keep all of these energetic ringers busy, so when this happens I borrow bells from a local high school or my church. We perform all styles and genres of music, but we particularly enjoy new original works for handbells as well as unique arrangements. We are fortunate to get to work with UWO composition faculty and their students and have read and performed several of their works. I hope that my students will one day fill community bell choirs around the state.

I'd like to give a special welcome to new members Joan Northouse and Saydi Olson. I'm looking forward to seeing you at an event. Thank you to all the members who renewed their membership! ### ANTHORNIS Ringing Event This Month!!

As of this writing, this event WILL happen—masked, but it will happen. Registration closed last month, but if you would still like to participate, contact the Registrar today for registration details: registrar, area 7@handbellmusicians.org.

To be as COVID-safe as possible, Area 7 has implemented some protocols that adhere to CDC guidelines and protocols adopted by the venue.

If you are participating in the event, you will be sent documents by the Registrar to self-check yourself each day of the event, and other Covid guidelines that must be followed.

If the outbreak numbers stay about where they are today, the public concert will go on. However, the 3:30 Saturday concert will be open to only those who are friends or family of the participating ringers. This is so we can ensure that we have enough space to social distance in the audience area. If we must limit the audience numbers, the participating ringers will be asked to inform their guests of the limited space.

Whether you're participating in the event or just a spectator, you are encouraged to bring a non-perishable food item to support the local STEP Food Shelf.

### Notes: Karen Van Wert-Conference Choir Conductor

**Conference Choir** is an opportunity for ringers to excel at their craft, work with a group of equally dedicated musicians, and present three well-prepared pieces in concert. Come with music prepared and we will fine tune it as an ensemble during the festival. Lake Superior is the inspiration for the selections we will be performing.

Kathleen Wissinger's Call of the Water "Living Water" is an original work that includes bell tree, singing bells, wind chimes, and finger cymbals. Envision awaking to the undulating sound of the waves coming ashore in the Duluth Harbor, quietly beckoning you to the water. The piece builds as a typical day in the harbor: people gather and there is a natural bustle of activity, with the lake always a constant in the scene. There is a sense of the water getting deeper, a reflection of a deepening faith found in "Living Water." I feel the sun shining throughout and the calm that water often brings.

While at the lake shore, you might want to wade in the water on a hot day. Sandra Eithun captures this feeling with the rhythmic African-American spiritual, "Wade in the Water". The ringers are going to love this piece because it is energetic, powerful, and satisfying. The audience will hate to see this piece end, so pay attention, as it goes quickly.

We will be premiering "Built on the Rock" (arr. Kevin McChesney), commissioned by Area 7 in honor of my

time as the Area 7 Chair and to those who served with me. When I hear this piece, I think of Split Rock Light House standing tall on the rocky cliff of Lake Superior. This strong beacon shines bright like the church bells—calling, praising, warning. Kevin's arrangement features an optional bell tree because I love a good bell tree part. I love the diversity of emotions in the piece, from crumbling spires to strengthening spirit, all while the bells are still chiming and ringing.

I am overjoyed to be directing the Conference Choir at the 2022 Area 7 Festival in Duluth, MN. I've been waiting almost five years for this event. I hope you will consider participating in the Conference Choir. I promise an unforgettable experience.



### **Bronze Plus Choir Notes**

The Bronze Plus choir at the Festival Conference will be comprised of a single six-octave group, performing music at levels 4-5. It will be a wonderful opportunity for 13-14 outstanding handbell musicians to perform very challenging, engaging music in a professional atmosphere. Musicians must arrive with the music fully prepared, and be willing and able to make any changes when needed.

"Prologue and Rhythmic Dance" is an original composition by Cathy Moklebust, commissioned in honor of the 10th anniversary of the Back Bay Ringers of Boston, Massachusetts. The mystical mood of the Prologue is followed by a light and lively dance, using triangle, bongos, and tambourine to accentuate the rhythmic patterns of 7/8, 4/4, 6/8, 3/4, and 10/8.

Area 7's community of Waupaca, Wisconsin commissioned Cathy in 1997 to write a piece in memory of Ms. Margaret Miller, a champion of the fine arts in her community who was selected as Wisconsin's "Most Active Senior," and honored at the 1987 State Fair. "Remembrance" illustrates Margaret's passion for the arts combined with the hard work, diligence, and perseverance required to bring quality music to her community.

And now for something completely different... Hart Morris' arrangement of the Irving Berlin classic "Puttin' on the Ritz." Drum set and string bass combine to form a swinging, energetic rendition of the song made popular in the 1974 Mel Brooks movie "Young Frankenstein"—or is it "Frankensteen?" Lol...

This weekend at my church, we were able to ring as a full choir for the first time in over a year. Oh, how we all missed that big, glorious five-octave sound! After a year of smaller ensembles, distanced, and on individual music stands, it was so good to feel a bit "normal" again.



### Kathy Ebling Shaw, Conductor

Marking her almost thirtieth year as conductor of the Westminster Concert Bell Choir, Kathleen Ebling Shaw is a member of the sacred music department at Westminster Choir College of Rider University, where she teaches classes in handbell training and conducts a second handbell choir. She is a graduate of Westminster Choir College.



Well known as a handbell clinician,

Mrs. Shaw has conducted sessions for the Handbell Musicians of America (AGEHR) both on the local and national levels. Other engagements have included sessions for the American Guild of Organists; the New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Texas Music Educators Conferences; Choristers Guild; Presbyterian Association of Musicians Conferences; the St. Olaf Church Music Conference; and International Handbell Symposia.

She traveled with the Westminster Concert Bell Choir during a critically acclaimed 15-city North American "A Royal Christmas" tour, performing with Julie Andrews, Christopher Plummer, Charlotte Church and the Royal Philharmonic Concert Orchestra.

Choirs under the direction of Mrs. Shaw have performed at Carnegie Hall and the World Financial Center's Festival of Light and Sound. They have also been featured on Lifetime Television, QVC, NBC's Today Show, New Jersey Network, Mister Rogers' Neighborhood and NBC's nationally televised Lighting of the Rockefeller Center Christmas Tree.

Mrs. Shaw is also the recipient of an Alumni Merit Award from Westminster Choir College of Rider University in recognition of her dedication to the art of handbell ringing and her enthusiasm and accomplishments in the classroom as well as the concert hall.

"Helping Hands from Handbells"



The event is named "Anthornis" after New Zealand bellbirds. The bellbirds sing loud, rich rambling songs, often in duet or with neighboring birds in concert. They

have three distinct songs; one most often sung at dawn, is a series of pure, bell-like tones from which the bird gets its name. Note

that a bell shape is formed when the two birds are combined in the logo above.

### **Congratulations to Lee Afdahl**



Luther College announced the 2021 recipients of the Distinguished Service Award. The award is presented to alumni or individuals with strong connections to Luther College who have exhibited admirable service to society in areas such as education, government, the arts, business, church, labor, industry, agriculture, research, medicine, and community affairs. One of the nine recipients is Area 7's own Lee Afdahl!

Lee Afdahl's 50-year career as a church musician, organist, conductor, and composer has taken him from Michigan to St. Paul. In 1991 he moved to Rochester, Minnesota, where he served 28 years as director of music and organist at First Presbyterian Church. He retired as director of music emeritus in 2019.

Lee has been a conductor and clinician for handbell, choral, and church music conferences nationally and internationally. He is a past president of the Handbell Musicians of America and represented the organization as a conductor at the International Handbell Symposia in Australia in 1994, the United Kingdom in 2012, and South Korea in 2014.

He is an active organ recitalist, published composer, and arranger of handbell, instrumental, and choral music with over 100 compositions and arrangements in print. He continues to volunteer time for the American Guild of Organists, Choristers Guild, Handbell Musicians of America, and the Rochester Music Guild. Prior to retiring Lee organized an extensive free concert series for 28 years, and additional seasonal recitals to serve the Rochester community.

"We have 12 students in 7th and 8th grade ringing this year. Everyone is new to ringing! We are pretty good at reading rhythms but our latest challenge is remembering which hand rings which bell. We hope to share some music at one of our weekly chapel services in the upcoming weeks. Parents and teachers have

### Starting a Handchime Choir in a Senior Living Community

In the summer of 2017, Judy Kereakos, resident of Charter House in Rochester, MN, proposed to the administration that a handchime choir could be pursued and added to the wide variety of programs already in place at this Continuing Care Retirement Community. That resident, Judy Kereakos, who



would lead the choir, along with the Activities/ Event Coordinator, scheduled an informational meeting in August 2017, for those interested in participating in a handchime choir.

There were 16 residents who attended. Information on the handchimes, how they are constructed, and why they were chosen over handbells, as well as watching a video of chimes being rung constituted the meeting.

Following that introductory meeting, one resident attending asked to meet with Judy. The resident shared that she had been wishing for many years to have a bell choir at Charter House. She then offered that she and her

husband would like to provide the funds for whatever equipment was needed. What a lovely surprise and show of support.

They ordered three octaves of chimes, and the choir was named Charter Chimes. Rehearsals began on September 12, 2017. The 16 residents present at the

introductory meeting all returned. By December 2017, more ringers had joined and, fortunately, Charter House purchased a fourth octave of chimes at that time.

Each weekly rehearsal, the facility's staff sets up the rehearsal room with a chair and stand for each ringer. All residents are seated. A stand attachment with a small shelf is provided for the stands of those who ring more than two chimes.

A notebook for the music is available for each ringer.

If needed by a resident, the size of the music is enlarged either through use of Finale™ music software or enlarging the music on a copy machine. The lighting in the room is very important and, if possible, includes both natural and ceiling lighting.

Not all present at the introductory meeting and first rehearsal were music readers, but the majority had played some band instrument or had taken piano lessons in their youth.

Based on this scenario, a system that Judy had used with a church youth choir was put into place where chime pitches are assigned a color: for example, C notes are red, D's are yellow, E's are blue, and so on with all notes of the scale. The ringer's



music is color-coded by the director. A corresponding color dot is placed on the chime handle and the spine of the ringer's notebook. This allows non-musicreaders to participate more quickly. For the first several weeks of rehearsals, in addition to note

reading there was a focus on note values, rests, repeat signs, and dynamic markings, and soon the choir began to learn the necessary skills to move forward.

The Charter Chimes rings at the facility Sunday vespers and Variety Show, has done a combined concert with Homestead Chimes, a local senior living facility, and looks forward to additional performance opportunities in the future.

During the past four years of the group's existence, residents have shared several motivations for their participation. Several shared their desire to learn a new skill knowing that the challenge will be beneficial to them. Some have been in other music groups but no longer find that to be possible. The comment is also made that a chime choir provides a way to be with others, share and achieve a goal, and socialize.

A quote from <u>science.news.org</u>, August 14, 2010, states, "Music lights up almost every area of the brain, which shouldn't be a surprise since it makes people tap their feet, encourages reflection on memories, and has the potential to lighten the mood."
