

# Letter From The Chair by Anita Fraundorf

I asked and you answered. Thank you to the people who responded to the email question I posed in September regarding what was happening with ringing around the Area. As you can expect, it ranged from "nothing is happening" to some full ensemble rehearsals. Many programs are unable to access the building or equipment and ringers are reluctant to or unable to gather in a group. Some ringers not able to ring with a group are experimenting with solo ringing or bell trees. Ensembles that are rehearsing have individual tables spaced apart with no sharing of bells. The ringers wear masks and disinfect the bells at the end of rehearsal. Overwhelmingly the most common response from people able to ring are gathering in smaller groups; most ringing 12 bell music. Some are together to ring for enjoyment while others are ringing in order to video a piece to include with their online service or to play during in-person worship. With 12 bell music, each ringer is able to have his/her own music stand and binder without sharing bells. (A Covid Ringing Comprehensive Ensemble Music List was posted on the Area 7 FB page in early September).

If you aren't able to ring with a group or borrow bells in order to practice solos, do you have access to your music binder? At home, take spoons and utensils (or even pans), find a recording of the song you want to practice and listen to the music while you "ring" your utensils. If you can't access your music binder, Handbell World or other Music Publishers have recordings of songs and many have the music available for preview so you can play along. Maybe there is a song with a tricky rhythm that you can practice by tapping the table or clapping the rhythm. Just think how much farther ahead you will be when your group is able to be together again!

Area 7's Board is discussing ways to offer virtual bell topics. See page 2 for more information on virtual Area 7 events. By the time you read this, Bells of the Lakes will have presented their virtual seminar. Other Areas around the country are having virtual ringing or workshops. And there are always YouTube videos of performances that can help ease the pain of separation from bells and ringing friends.

Board news: At our Board meeting in September, we welcomed Michelle Finlon as our C.H.I.M.E. Representative (overseeing our bell and chime loan program) and Lee Afdahl as our Past Chair. # 11:20- Let's All Ring Together

As social distancing takes us further apart and potentially simpler music leaves musicality a bit exposed, ringing chords together has become more difficult and more important. Ringing together is dependent on anticipation, awareness, and execution. Even beginning ringers can quickly be taught skills to help them anticipate and execute a perfect chord every time.

### 9:15- Bell Tree Beginnings - Where Do I Start?

Start with a single strand of bells and inexpensive equipment. String a tree, discover the \$5 BT pole, and ring. You will be given simple melodies to play that sound great on the bell tree. From solo to ensemble, we will talk about ways you can be creative with bell trees in your situation. Bell trees are handy to have in your toolbox anytime but especially during this time of virtual music.

## 10:15- Bell Trees Beyond 1st Tree

Got a taste of BT ringing and want more? Expand from one tree to four, from one octave to two, from single pole to BT stand. Explore various equipment options including stands, separators, and mallets. Ring melodies that transition from one string to another and back again. Incorporate flats/sharps giving you full range of two octaves. Investigate published music and learn practical applications for skills learned.

# I I:00-Bell Tree Creativity – Hymn Embellishments Made Easy!

There are so many easy ways you can add embellishments to make a hymn shine – through ostinato phrases, rhythms, and more. A few basic skills will empower you. We'll turn your creativity loose so you will return home with ideas of how to embellish a hymn tune using a simple bell tree. Bell Tree Beginnings or BT ringing experience are required.

# 11:45- Bell Trees Plus Choir - Extending BT Skills

Bell trees were introduced to the handbell community in the 1980's by Louise Frier. She developed this concept to extend her choir and involve more people by combining handbells and chimes at the table with Bell Tree as a processional element. It also added an element of show to concerts and special occasions. I will take you on a journey through BT & choir music and adapting music for BT & choir.

# **C.H.I.M.E Grant**

Area 7 welcomes Michelle Finlon as the C.H.I.M.E. Representative. Michelle Finlon began ringing handbells at Mount Calvary Lutheran Church in Eagan, MN in middle school, and returned there to ring again starting in 2010 after a hiatus for college and graduate school. Since the fall of 2018, she has also been ringing as a member of Twin Cities Bronze. She previously served on the Area 7 Board as the Youth Events Planner from 2014-2017. Outside of handbells, Michelle works as a Business Analyst and enjoys playing tennis and reading in her free time.



Area 7 is fortunate to have two 3-octave sets of handchimes and two 3-octave sets of handbells to provide to grant recipients at Area 7 schools, churches, senior living facilities and other community organizations. In addition to the instruments; music, technique manuals, curriculum suggestions, and support needed to start a program is provided to the grant recipients. The instruments are used to create a handchime/handbell ensemble which will teach ringers concepts of music, teamwork, mental focus, and the joy of personal achievement. We want everyone to have the opportunity to experience the fun and learning that handchimes/handbells offer. Grant recipients have the instruments from September through May to grow their music program.

This year, grant recipients are Reek Elementary School in Lake Geneva, Wisconsin and Homestead Senior Living in Rochester, Minnesota. We are excited to see the great things these groups will add to our handbell/handchime community in Area 7.

Whether you are a part of a church, school, senior living facility or community ensemble; Area 7 is here to help promote handchimes/ handbells. Do you know someone that is looking to build their music program? Or a group that is ringing and could use an extra set of bells or chimes so they can ring socially distanced and not share bells? 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


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
