Young Ringers Camp

Do you have a youth handbell choir at your church? Or do you have youth ringing with your adult ensemble? Area 7 invites all interested youth handbell ringers to join us this summer for Young Ringers Camp! We are so excited to be heading to Camp Omega on Horseshoe Lake by Waterville, MN for Young Ringers Camp on June 23-25, 2023.

Who can come to camp? Young Ringers Camp is open to all children and youth handbell ringers 4th grade and up. Directors can bring anywhere from their entire ensemble to a few ringers, depending on ringers' availability. Less than full choirs, individuals, and small groups are welcome to attend—we can find a spot for them too!

Are there adults at camp? In addition to the guest conductor and staff from Area 7, each church is responsible for sending chaperones to be with their ringers throughout the weekend. All adults are welcome to ring with the kids. We can all learn together!

What if I don't know the other ringers at camp? All the events at YRC are aimed at bringing youth together. We do games, team building activities, meals, service projects, and ringing together. All campers will get to know one another in a very short period of time.

Where do we sleep and eat for camp? The accommodations at Camp Omega are fantastic. We have our own lodge just for Young Ringers Camp participants. Inside the lodge is a large open room for gathering and games. There are two large dorm rooms with bunk beds (one for girls/women and one for boys/men). The facility has heating and air conditioning. For meals we all walk up the hill from our private lodge to the main lodge for breakfast, lunch, and dinner.

Why bell camp? The three days of camp are the equivalent of six one-hour rehearsals of ringing. It's a wonderful opportunity for young people (and adult chaperones) to increase their skill level and have the opportunity to perform in a massed handbell concert. Young ringers are always looking for that special *something* to look forward to all season long. Knowing they are going to be attending Young Ringers Camp in June can help ringers to stay focused learning music and serves as a great celebration for a year of hard work.

How can we learn the music? There are **three** pieces of music that need to be learned in advance of attending Young Ringers

Camp. The easiest way to learn the music is to incorporate the pieces into your repertoire this season. However, if you have youth ringing with your adult ensemble, this may not always be possible. Special choir sessions can be set up in the spring for interested individual or small group ringers to attend in major cities (Minneapolis, Rochester, Duluth, Sioux Falls, etc.). Contact Youth Events Planner lessica Haeder for more information.

Ideas to pay for camp? Bringing your whole ensemble to Young Ringers Camp can be expensive. Start thinking now of fundraising opportunities to offset the full price of camp. How about a special offering during a performance of the handbell choir? Is there a church foundation where you can apply for a grant or scholarship from your church? Area 7 has one Clista Wood Memorial Scholarship available for camp. More information can be found on the Area 7 website or you can email to pastchair.area7@handbellmusicians.org

Sounds like fun, what's the next step?

You've marked the date on your calendar, music is being learned by the ringers, fundraising is underway, but don't forget to **REGISTER**. All ringing participants and chaperones must register no later than **April 1, 2023**, with a \$50 downpayment. The rest (\$140) would be due by May 31. Registration materials are available on the *Area 7 website* as well as later in this newsletter.

What is the service project? We will be putting together kits to support the Ronald McDonald House in Minneapolis. There is also a contest—who can bring the most pop top tabs?! Start saving all of your pop top tabs and bring them to camp.

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It's Good to Be Back!



After a hiatus due to Covid-19, it was a great joy to have the children's bell program back this fall! This group of elementary ringers is composed of 2nd-6th graders. Half of them were brand new in October and have been busy learning all about ringing and how to read music. Our upper elementary kids serve as mentors to the younger ringers and help them to be successful. We bring in a few older siblings to play the remaining bells to fill out the ensemble for worship.

Music I love using with beginners:

- Martha Lynn Thompson's "Tunes That Teach." This is a great reproducible book that features exercises, activity pages, and full performance pieces in 2 and 3-octave versions.
- "Ode to Joy" arranged by Kathleen Wissinger in the Class Ring series. This particular version is a favorite of mine because it is attainable for every ringer, even those who are just learning how to read music. Included is a full score, unison exercises, and (my favorite) extracted parts! Giving a new ringer an extracted part that only shows their two bells on the staff makes it easy to be successful and less intimidated. Experienced ringers can play from the full score, and all the ringers are able to ring together.

The children learned multiple pieces last fall and shared their music monthly in worship and for Christmas. They are looking forward to ringing three bells (accidentals) this winter and learning more bell techniques; mart lift, echo, and TLD are their favorites!



CHIME Report

I wish to thank the Area 7 Handbell Musicians of America for the loan of a 3-octave set of handchimes, along with pads, folders, and music, which have allowed me to teach handchimes to some children at a local mobile home park in Corcoran, MN, through the ministry there of Mobile Hope. It has been a challenge, and I have been stretched many ways to find the best way to teach and guide these kids. We started with eleven, dropped to eight, jumped up to ten, but ended at eight. They were younger than I had hoped for, most being in the 2nd and 3rd grades, but a couple joined us from the 5th grade. We learned two simple pieces to perform for their Christmas program: "Kum ba Yah" and "God Is So Good." We were able to do a practice run at my church on December 11, and the kids were able to remain focused throughout the performance and did really well. They

did the same songs for their Christmas program on December 19, and the parents and volunteer staff loved it. One volunteer mentioned to me that she never would have expected this group of kids to be able to pull this off.



Mobile Hope does not have a spring program for the children, but these kids would like to continue to ring chimes, and I believe they have a basic foundation now on which we can build more easily, so I hope to start them up again in February and will work with the Director of Mobile Hope to plan a way for them to share their music.



In addition, my pastor at Christ's Community Moravian Church has been wanting me to teach bells to their choir. Since I had the handchimes with me, I decided to teach the chimes to the choir, which include three youth who play other instruments. We had enough for a full 3-octave group. For Christmas Eve they are doing a descant to "O Come, All Ye Faithful,", and a simple version of "Ode t Joy" by Beethoven, arr. Charles Maggs. I would like to

teach the latter to the Mobile Hope kids this spring. I was able to borrow the music from the wRight Ringers bell choir repertoire.

Cedar United Methodist Church in Ham Lake had a 3-octave set of handbells that were not being used, so when I was their interim pastor in 2019-2020, we dusted them off and got a bell choir going. I am still directing them. We have growing numbers of youth who have also expressed interest, so it may be possible this spring to use the chimes to begin to introduce these kids to ringing and help the church decide if they would like to purchase a set of chimes to augment their handbell program



I'm not sure what I've gotten myself into, but I am grateful for the opportunity you have given me to share my love of ringing with others, and especially with youth. I am hoping this plants seeds for their future.

Brian has earned degrees from Appalachian State University and the M. Christopher White School of Divinity at Gardner-Webb University. In 2022 he conducted Distinctly Bronze West, an auditioned group of ringers from throughout the nation, in New Bern, NC. In 2023 he conducted the inaugural "Ringing Nativity," a staged production of the nativity story, at the Museum of the Bible in Washington, D.C. He has served churches throughout the Southeast, building vibrant programs for choirs, handbells, and instrumentalists at each. He is currently on the music staff at Myers Park United Methodist Church in Charlotte, NC.

Brian's compositions are published through a variety of publishers, including Bellissimo Publications (available through Jeffers Handbells) and Cantate Press (available through JW Pepper). Brian enjoys creating and shaping commissioned music that is meaningful, distinctive, expressive, and timely. His devotional book *Ringing Deeply* for directors, and ringers, has been received with strong reviews and is in its third printing.

Brian is married to Keely Childers, a professional counselor, and has two adult children, Hannah and Spencer, both of whom served as drum majors in their respective high school and college marching bands. Brian is an avid runner and a rabid fan of the San Antonio Spurs.
