Elsewhere in this newsletter, you will find the list of Board positions and the names of the people currently serving in those positions. There are both voting and non-voting members. Voting members serve two years with the option of serving an additional two years on the Board (with a slight variation for the Chair-Elect/Chair/Past-Chair track). As a voting member's term comes to a close, they may reach out to you to consider serving on the Board. Ask them about the expectations of the position, then please seriously consider saying, "Yes."

We will have three openings coming up at the end of September. Each position is a two-year term, October 1, 2023–September 30, 2025 (with an option to serve an additional two years).

- Twin Cities Sub-Area Chair and Southern WI Sub-Area Chair: These people are voting members of the board. They submit electronic reports, attend (virtual) meetings of the Board four to five times per year, keep in contact with other Handbell Musicians of America members in the sub-area, encourage other handbell directors or ringers to join HMA, and assist with Area 7 events as needed. - Membership Chair: This person is a voting member of the board. They receive electronic membership information monthly and forward that information to the sub-area chairs and other Board members. The Membership Chair also encourages membership in HMA, submits electronic reports, attends (virtual) meetings of the Board four to five times per year, and assists with Area 7 events as needed. It's not too late!

There are still a few CHIME Grants available for the 2023-2024 school year. The Committee for Handbells in Music Education (CHIME) promotes the use of handbells and handchimes in music education

programs in schools, churches, or other educational environments. If you are looking to introduce handbells or handchimes or expand an already existing program, the CHIME Grant provides a three-octave set of handbells or handchimes as well as foam and educational material to get you on your way.

Also, did you know there is a Bell Tree Grant available? The grant includes a bell tree stand, two arms, separators, processional poles, and mallets as well as access to a bell tree knowledge base. Report from one of our recent recipients

Handbell Musicians of America Handchime Program at Mobile Hope May 2023

I again wish to thank Area 7, HMA for the loan of a three-octave set of handchimes, along with pads and music. Our program, with children at a local mobile home park in Corcoran, MN, was begun in the fall of 2022, under the Mobile Hope Ministry there. We lost a few of the initial ringers but for our spring program five new children joined us for a total of ten. With new ringers, we continued to work on basic technique using songs with quarter notes, half notes, dotted half notes, and whole notes, and were able to play four songs for worship at Christ's Community Church in Maple Grove on May 7, 2023. Songs included "Old

Into the Forest 2023 Was Wildly Successful

The second "Into the Forest—Exploring Among the Trees" event was highly successful, doubling the number of participants that attended the 2019 event. Participants representing 17 states and Canada, with skills ranging from new to bell trees (BT) to elite performers, gathered in Lakeville, MN. We also had publishers, composers, **Forest**

and vendors present for this two-and-a-half-day event.

Throughout the event we emphasized sharing, exploring, and growing. Everyone has a perspective to share that we can all learn from. We encouraged everyone to explore new concepts or ideas on BTs available in class, on breaks, or in the 'playroom." The overarching goal of the event is to grow BTs as an art form through active participation and idea sharing. Pop-up performances were a highlight of the event (sightreading music to demonstrate a concept or idea). Everyone found new

music, ideas, and friendships to further their personal BT journey.

The two-and-a-half-day event culminated with a concert that was magical. Approximately 100 were in

attendance to witness the first BT concert ever performed. The concert opened with a tribute to Louise Frier with 19 ringers playing "The Journey" as a processional. The concert's 14 pieces demonstrated the creative uses of BTs: solo, duet, single string, processional, table to BT, adapted music, and BT with chimes and handbells. One of the concert participants was playing BTs for the first time. Excerpts of the concert may be seen on this playlist.

At the end of the concert, Area 7 Past Chair Anita Frandorf presented Karen Van Wert with a framed copy of "Built on the Rock," by Kevin McChesney. This piece was commissioned by Area 7 in honor of Karen's time as Chair and

includes a BT part. Note: "Built on the Rock" will be performed by the mass choir at the Area 7 2024 Festival. BT ringers are encouraged to start learning the BT part now.

Thank you to Area 7, Handbell Musicians of America, for endorsing this event, loaning equipment, hosting an evening meal, and your continued support of "Into the Forest" committee members. Special thanks to Anita Frandorf for manning the kitchen and helping behind the scenes, and to Alanna Terwagawa for opening her home and supporting us in so many ways.

Wesleyan Bells





From the Twin Cities Metro Sub-Area Chair

Recruiting Ringers and Volunteers



Currently I serve in volunteer positions for several organizations, and one common issue they all have is getting volunteers to help with the organization's missions.

I was recently talking to one of the other board members of my church

about getting members to volunteer at the church and we both came to the conclusion that guilt, which has been a common method for recruiting, doesn't work like it used to, and we need to do something different.

One idea is to describe not only the benefits to the organization or community but how the volunteer will benefit from volunteering as well. If we apply this method to handbell ringing, we may increase the number of ringers we have in our choirs.

Benefits of ringing in church choir

Fellowship – Choirs have between eight and 15 ringers and a director. During rehearsal ringers interact and become close over time. When I was a director, the ringers and I agreed that we looked forward to our Thursday rehearsals because they were therapeutic, and that is due to the fellowship we shared. I can remember stopping a rehearsal once just to support a member that was having a personal crisis that week.

Connection to the worship service – Many feel like they connect during worship by participating in services, but ringing with a group during a worship service makes me feel more connected to the ACT of worship.



Brain exercising – We have been told that exercising your brain may help reduce the effects of aging. Playing an instrument is a great way to keep your brain active. I have played several different instruments, and I think that nothing does this better them handbells.

Youth-only choirs – I started ringing as a 7th grader and have a strong belief that ringing for youth can benefit both the worship service and the youth. If a church has enough youth to have a full choir, the youth will not only experience the fellowship mentioned above, but they will have something to be actively involved in to keep them engaged with the church.

Intergenerational choirs – As youth develop strong ringing skills, they can be added to the "adult" choir. If a church doesn't have a youth choir adding interested youth to "adult" choir, can be a great way to increase the number of ringers. I directed an Intergenerational choir for 20 years and developed a rule that if a youth (under 16) wanted to ring with us, they had to have an adult family member ring as well. So I ended up with parents and grandparents in my choir with the kids. The parents enjoyed the connection with their kids from ringing together.

For the last four years I have served as the Twin Cities Sub-Area Chair, and I will be stepping down from this position in the fall of 2023 as there are term limits in place. As I look back on the last four years, I realize that the benefits of this position were more than I expected when I took this position, including:

Fellowship with Board – I created friendships with the great people that are on the board and the ones that were on the board at some point in my tenure.

Communications skills – The sub-area chair position requires me to communicate with all the members in the Twin Cities. I am not a strong communicator or writer, but this forced me to improved my skills in the area.

Forcing an introvert out of her comfort zone. Yes, I am an introvert, but I know that it is good to do things that make me uncomfortable, as they will allow me to grow as a person. Being in this position made me realize that I can do this type of thing and enjoy it. In

the last year, I have taken on the secretary job of my church's Planning Board (Church Council) and recently became the Chaplain of the American Legion Post 491 in Bayport, MN. I don't know if I would have taken on either of these roles had I not had experience as the Sub-Area Chair.

There will be three positions opening up on the Area 7 Board of Directors of the Handbell Musicians of America in October. Please consider volunteering for one of the positions this year. The following will be open in the fall:

- Twin-Cities Metro Sub-Area Chair
- Southern Wisconsin Sub-Area Chair
- Membership Coordinator

Also, the board is always looking for help with things like social media and website events. If you have skills and want to help, please let me or any of the other board members know.

I hope explaining the benefits of a volunteer position helps in recruiting for your choir and for the HMA. Thank you to all the members who renewed their membership! Please invite others to join and consider adding your ringers for only \$10/year per person. Let's keep our handbell organization strong and vital, both now and into the future!

Brian Childers is an accomplished composer, conductor, and clinician. His choral, instrumental, and handbell works are performed frequently throughout the world. He is in demand as a featured clinician and conductor at music conferences, festivals, and workshops across the nation. Brian serves as Music Advisor for Handbell Musicians of America, helping to promote the wealth of handbell music in the AGEHR Catalog.

Brian has earned degrees from Appalachian State University and the M. Christopher White School of Divinity at Gardner-Webb University. In 2022 he conducted Distinctly Bronze East, an auditioned group of ringers from throughout the nation, in New Bern, NC. In 2023 he conducted the inaugural *Ringing Nativity*, a staged production of the nativity story, at the Museum of the Bible in Washington, D.C. He has served churches throughout the Southeast, building vibrant programs for choirs, handbells, and instrumentalists at each. He is currently on the music staff at Myers Park United Methodist Church in Charlotte, NC.

Brian's compositions are published through a variety of publishers, including Bellissimo Publications (available through Jeffers Handbells) and Cantate Press (available through JW Pepper). Brian enjoys creating and shaping commissioned music that is meaningful, distinctive, expressive, and timely. His devotional book *Ringing Deeply* for directors and ringers has been received with strong reviews and is in its third printing.

Brian is married to Keely Childers, a professional counselor, and has two adult children, Hannah and Spencer, both of whom served as drum majors in their respective high school and college marching bands. Brian is an avid runner and a rabid fan of the San Antonio Spurs. Area 7 Festival 2024 Logo Winner Announced






But ringing bells was not the only thing that happened at camp. Friday night ended with a campfire where each group
