Four Scholarships Available for 2024 Festival Conference!

The Clista Wood Scholarship Fund was established to provide encouragement and assistance to eligible individuals to attend an Area 7 ringing/learning event.

Thanks to generous donations to this fund over the years, we are able to award four scholarships for the 2024 Festival Conference, June 21-23 in La Crosse, WI! Two of the scholarships are for the full three-day registration fees plus a \$100 stipend towards housing (if needed). Two additional scholarships cover the fees to attend classes for one day of the Festival Conference, either Friday or Saturday.

Applicants must be a full Handbell Musicians of America member, affiliated with a recognized member organization, or participate in a group directed by a full Handbell Musicians of America member. Recipients of the full event registration are expected to purchase and prepare the music, and register to participate in an attending ensemble or register as an individual ringer to be placed into an ensemble. Recipients of the one-day registration do not participate in rehearsals, just classes.

From the South Dakota Sub-Area Chair

The handbell choir at First Lutheran Church in Brookings, SD is an enthusiastic and dedicated group of mixed-age ringers and is under the direction of Ms. Barbara Horten. They enjoy contributing to the Festival Worship Service at 8:30am on Sunday mornings once a month throughout the school year with a

varied repertoire of music: traditional, contemporary, hymns, and gospel. The group rehearses from 5:45 to 6:45pm Wednesday evenings every week throughout the school year and always welcomes new ringers and those who are interested in learning to play the bells, even as an occasional sub.

The handbell choir uses a five-octave set of Whitechapel handbells; the original three octaves being a gift from the Towers family in 1956, and the 4th octave was purchased in the late 1970s. It is believed that First Lutheran Church may have been the first church in SD to have handbells, but this is unverified. The handbell program was initiated, developed, and directed by Mrs. Barbara Berntson until her retirement in the late 1980s. In 1975 Ms. Berntson took the high school group, The Towers Handbell Choir, to the National Festival in Logan, UT, where Donald Allured was one of the conductors. The young group performed two solo selections during that festival, one being written by high school sophomore Kevin Sippel. It was in this choir that Cathy Moklebust played, and the group remained together until the mid-1980s.

Various directors of music at First Lutheran Church continued directing the bells until Ms. Horten took the

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reins of the present choir in 2004. The group has grown musically and in numbers under her leadership, and it was during her tenure that the purchase of the 5th octave was completed. A particularly fun activity for the group was providing holiday music in the lobby of the local Hy-Vee supermarket, and several members of the choir recently attended the handbell festival in Watertown, SD. In January they also provided music for the local Sons of Norway chapter.



The group is very proud of their history, their bells, and their director! This writer is very pleased to be ringing with them again since returning to Brookings in 2015.

Youth Chimes on the Cheyenne River Reservation

When you combine the statements below, they become an innovative and effective formula for "Teaching Elementary Music With Chimes in Uncharted Territory!" I experienced several exciting successes using chimes in my elementary music classroom while teaching for 13 years on the Cheyenne River Reservation in Eagle Butte, SD. More importantly, our Native American students achieved a great deal of uninhibited success.

- 1. Most youth chime choirs exist primarily in afterschool church music programs.
- 2. Chimes can be an alternative way to teach note-

reading skills to elementary children.

- 3. Rhythmic and percussive skills are enhanced by playing handchimes.
- 4. There are fewer sanitary concerns for children when playing chimes vs. playing wind instruments, e.g. recorders—especially during COVID, etc.
- 5. By playing only one or two notes, or parts of a chordal accompaniment, youth chime choirs can achieve quicker success. The logistics speak for themselves.
- 6. Native American Reservations are usually in remote locations and have fewer music education opportunities at the elementary level.
- 7. Listen carefully—handchimes pleasantly resemble the beautiful tones of a Native flute.

Chimes were introduced in 3rd grade and used more frequently with the 4th and 5th graders. The music department owned three complete octaves of handchimes and one additional two-octave set, so every child in each classroom was able to play chimes during their weekly music classes. By borrowing an additional three octaves for concert performances, it was possible to have as many as 80 children simultaneously playing chimes. Now that is definitely a joyful trip into uncharted territory!

One cultural success story I have using chimes was to develop a chordal accompaniment on chimes using a familiar Native American song. We were assisted by a local Native American woman who "signed" the song while approximately sixty 4th graders played chimes and another 20 students did interpretive dance wearing their native powwow attire. Native children are often rather shy in discovering their singing voice, so using drums, chimes, and other percussion instruments really can accentuate their creativity and self-expression.





Strikepoint Announces Japan, International **Symposium Tour**

It's been a busy year of planning,

budgeting, rehearsing, and communicating for Duluth-based Strikepoint. This August, the 11member group will travel to Hamamatsu, lapan to participate in



the 21st International Handbell Symposium.

It has been 38 years since Strikepoint last visited Japan. That was for the 2nd International Symposium, held in Gotemba. Many of the friendships formed at that 1986 event are still strong to this day. Three members of Strikepoint who participated at Gotemba are returning this year: Sue Marquardt, Nancy Eaton,

and Bill Alexander. This year's event will host 700 handbell musicians.

The International Symposium is held every two years and rotates among the



world's seven (so far) countries with national handbell organizations. Strikepoint has previously participated in five symposia—Japan, USA (Albuquerque and Orlando), England (Birmingham). and Canada (Toronto).

Beginning in April Strikepoint will be playing a limited number of domestic concerts as they prepare to depart for Japan. If you have an interest in booking one of these dates, they will need to be within approximately 150 miles of Duluth and will be fundraising concerts to help with the tour. However, 20% of each concert's offering donation will be given to the concert host's handbell or music program.

It's going to be an exciting year!

Handchime Program at Mobile Hope

I again wish to thank the Handbell Musicians of America for the loan of a three-octave set of handchimes, along with pads, folders, and music that have allowed me to teach handchimes to some children at a local mobile home park in Corcoran, MN through the ministry there of Mobile Hope. Our one-year loan began in the fall of 2022, with two performances that December and another in April 2023. We were given an extension of the loan through this December and had our last performance on December 10.

This past fall we had eight ringers and played two songs for the Christmas program at Christ's Community Church in Maple Grove: "Gentle Mary Laid Her Child" (arr. John A. Behnke), and "A Simple Song of Joy" by Michael R. Keller. We worked on improving techniques we had learned, focusing a lot on the dynamics of the piece. We had hoped to attend the KidsRing event this past October so that the kids could practice their skills and see what handbells can do but were unable to do that. We did also have bells playing at this year's Christmas program. I was so glad to show them to the kids and hopefully planted some seeds for the future.

I tried to connect with the music teacher at their elementary school to find a way for ongoing opportunities at the end of our loan period but was unsuccessful. I will continue to pursue this, as the HMA program provides a good option for schools that want to expand their repertoire for teaching music.



One of the Mobile Hope staff members reminded me of the good lessons learned in a handchime choir, beyond playing the instrument. For one, they're realizing the importance of a team effort so that all the notes are covered. After our recent program, one of the kids gave me a card she had made, thanking me for doing the chimes. She ended with, "I love chimes so, so much." Perhaps indeed some seeds have been planted. Thank you again.

In 1999 she became the founding artistic and music director for Twin Cities Bronze, (Minneapolis-St. Paul), and now serves as the music and artistic director for Bells of the Hills in Rapid City, SD. She is an alumni ringer at Distinctly Bronze East,

Distinctly Bronze West, and more recently the Bay View Week of Handbells in Petoskey, MI.

Monica has served as director of handbells in Methodist, Episcopal, and Lutheran churches from Minnesota to Louisiana. She is an instructor at the International Music Camp Summer School of Fine Arts and in 2004 was named its handbell coordinator when she succeeded its founder, Fred A. Merrett.

Monica received Accreditation in Massed Conducting at the first AGEHR Master Classes on Conducting and has completed studies with Dr. Donald Allured, Dr. Paul Rosene, William Griffin, David Davidson, and Dr. William Payn. She has conducted festivals and workshops throughout the United States, Canada, the United Kingdom, Australia, Puerto Rico, and Hong Kong. In 2017 Monica was selected to conduct the All-Star Choir at the Handbell Musicians of America National Seminar in Anaheim, CA, and conducted Reaching for Bronze in New Bern, NC in March 2020.

Monica has served in a variety of leadership roles for the Handbell Musicians of America (formerly the American Guild of English Handbell Ringers). She served on the Area 7 Board of Directors (1994–2002), the National AGEHR Committee for Handbells/ Chimes In Music Education (CHIME), Area Representative to the AGEHR Executive Committee (1997–1998) and was Special Interest Department Chair for the National Board of Directors.

In 2004 Monica opened her independent small business for handbell and handchimes repairs and refurbishments: Ringing Restorations. She has achieved the distinction of Master Technician through her exemplary and detailed service in the repair, maintenance, and refurbishment of handbells and handchimes.

Monica brings her extensive training, passion, knowledge, and enthusiasm for handbells and handchimes to every forum and venue, providing a challenging, successful, and fun experience for its participants. "It is an honor to be nominated for Area 7 Chair-Elect. - Apr 15 Ringers for the two Specialty Choirs will be selected by Area Board member

- **Apr 30 Specialty Choir ringing assignments** will be determined, and scores sent via USPS
