In addition to all the ringing, I loved getting to know people at the Bells and Beer event, paddleboat cruise, and Saturday night happy hour. Building relationships with bell people is what it's all about.

In July I attended the National Seminar in Hartford, Connecticut along with 13 other Area 7 friends. National Seminar is jam-packed with opportunities to take 14 classes, optional

ringing tracks, and to attend eight concerts featuring ringers from across the country. It's a great opportunity to meet composers, handbell manufacturers, and publishers, and to meet new bell friends from the United States, Canada, Singapore, Columbia, Brazil, and Hong Kong.

Now that it's August, it's time to get ready for the fall ringing season. This month is the time to prepare for upcoming ringing opportunities. Do you have a new technique you want to work on? Maybe you want to diversify your skills and learn a new ringing position, or you have a favorite piece you would like to program. Talk to your director now. 

Bells of the Hills

Bells of the Hills, Rapid City, South Dakota was founded by De Aun Wes more than 20 years ago. An organizational letter of invitation to Dakota was founded by De Aun West start a community handbell ensemble in Rapid City was sent to various

churches and interested individuals in October 2001. Bells of the Hills' rehearsal "home" since its inception has been First Presbyterian Church in Rapid City. They ring the instruments of both American manufacturers: five-and-a-half octaves of Schulmerich Bells (C_3-G_8) ; seven octaves of Malmark Choirchimes (C_2-C_8) ; and, so far, two Malmark Aluminum bass bells (C_2 and G_2).

Bells of the Hills has performed concerts throughout South Dakota, Nebraska, and Wyoming at such notable venues as the Opera House in Lead, Showcase Choir for the 2008 Area 7 Festival Conference, and several cross-state concerts with Heartland Handbells of Sioux Falls. Over the years Bells of the Hills has presented handbell workshops for ringers and directors throughout the area, hosted Ring-Ins at the Rushmore Mall for local handbell ringers, and ushered in the holiday season ringing at the Kettle Kick Off for the Salvation Army.

Bells of the Hills has adopted a mentorship role, teaching handbell techniques and methodology to choirs such as the Cornerstone Bible Institute in Hot

Springs when they started their handbell program. In 2017 Monica McGowan was named Artistic and Music Director, prompting her move back to Custer, South Dakota in May 2018.

Bells of the Hills maintains a performance schedule of concerts in May and December showcasing the expansive variety and diversity of handbell repertoire. Emerging from their forced hiatus after COVID, Bells of the Hills is weathering the challenges of personnel changes as well as the personal challenges some of its members are currently experiencing. New members have joined the ensemble, and creative handbell assignments have challenged those ringers to do "more with less."

The Bells of the Hills Board of Directors and Artistic Director agreed to adopt a more positive approach for the Spring 2024 rehearsal season. Rather than struggle to fledge a full ensemble and stress about rehearsing repertoire for a yet-to-be-named concert date, they are devoting this spring's rehearsal schedule to in-house skill and drill sessions, reviewing techniques, refining skills, perfecting their musicality, and honing their sense of ensemble. Outreach and recruitment efforts are being implemented for membership opportunities for interested handbell ringers in the greater Rapid City area to join Bells of the Hills for their fall rehearsal season.

To further their educational mission, Bells of the Hills is offering a handbell workshop this September for all handbell ringers and directors from the geographic areas of Wyoming, Nebraska, and South Dakota. Ringers and directors are encouraged to attend and invited to experience this day-long educational opportunity. Heartland Handbells began in 2005 when a gift of four octaves of Schulmerich handbells was given in memory of Doriene Halvorson—a handbell ringer, composer, and arranger—for the purpose of starting a community handbell choir. Jack Mohlenhoff and Pat Penn led the group in the early days, with Jack

wielding the baton and Pat as artistic director. When Jack retired, Pat was promoted to director and served in that role until 2019 when she moved to Iowa City to be near her grandchildren. Gene LeVasseur, who had served as guest percussionist and substitute director, took over as director at that time.

Heartland performs two concerts each year: a Christmas concert in December and a Spring concert in April or May. The concerts often include guest musicians—percussionists, pianists, organists, flutists, and even a bagpipe player. Over the years they have performed in combined concerts with other musical groups including Bells of the Hills from Rapid City, High Plains Woodwinds, Sioux Empire Brass, Prairie Song, the Singing Boys of Sioux Falls, Sioux Falls Children's Choir, and the First United Methodist bell choir, Les Cloches. Heartland also performed at "Christmas at the Cathedral" in Sioux Falls in 2013 as well as providing pre-show entertainment in the lobby of the Washington Pavilion for the South Dakota Symphony Orchestra's Christmas concert in 2016.

Heartland ringers are from the Sioux Falls area but also have

ringers from Madison, Garretson, and Brookings. We currently have 14 ringers and seven on our substitute list but anticipate having a couple of openings this fall. Our ringers have a variety of day jobs including music educators, pastor, dental professional, and a variety of other professions. The one thing Heartland members have in common is they all love to ring and strive to have fun while making extraordinary music.

In the spring semester of 2023, Heartland was honored to have Cathy Moklebust ring as a substitute in the C-D4 position and perform in the Spring concert. That concert also included Brian Tervo's arrangement of "Singin' in the Rain" which was synced to Gene Kelly's dance scene from the movie of the same name. The audience loved it, and Gene (the director) did an amazing job of keeping the tempo perfectly in sync to the video.

Heartland is blessed to partner with 1st Presbyterian Church of Sioux Falls who provides rehearsal space for the group and generously shares their fifth octave of bells, Malmark handchimes, and bell tables. The group consists of skilled ringers from Sioux Falls and the surrounding area who meet to rehearse weekly from September through April.

Looking ahead, Heartland would like to keep beautiful bell music alive and vibrant in South Dakota, and has been talking about possibly hosting a handbell festival in the Sioux Falls area. Besides performing concerts Heartland will consider other performances.



Strikepoint is pleased to announce that Derek




