

# Handbell Ringer, Director, Innovator, Musician, Enthusiast ...

# Bill Alexander

The handbell world lost one of the great ones last month. Bill Alexander passed away January 13, surrounded by his family.

Bill Alexander was the director of handbells at First United Methodist Church (also known as the Coppertop) in Duluth, MN, for more than 45 years. The church's bell program grew to include ringers of all ages and abilities in five choirs, including Strikepoint.

In 1984, Bill formed Strikepoint and began redrawing the possibilities for handbell ensembles. The unique, directorless ensemble took the world by storm and toured nearly every state, as well as England, Scotland, Wales, Canada, Sweden, Hong Kong, and Japan during his 40 years leading the ensemble. Strikepoint has produced nine albums; many ringers still have the original vinyl and cassette tape recordings from the early years.

In August 2024, Bill traveled to Japan with Strikepoint for the International Handbell Symposium. Each of the eight member countries of the international handbell organization selected one ensemble to participate in the International Handbell Concert. Strikepoint was honored to be chosen to represent the United States.



Bill was always in high demand as a conductor at area, national and international handbell events. His background in instrumental conducting, his ease of working with both youth and adult musicians, and his comfort conducting massed ensembles made him a popular choice as a clinician and massed ringing conductor. In addition to handbells, Bill was a school instrumental music educator for more than 45 years. Thousands of students learned to love band in his class.

Area 7 is incredibly grateful for the decades of leadership that Bill shared with us. He served on the Area 7 board multiple times and always said "yes" when we asked if he was interested in a new role. Bill served as Area Chair for the first time back in 1992, most recently completed a term as Publications in 2024, and filled many roles in between. For more than 30 years Bill could be found sharing his gifts with Area 7 as a clinician for the Director's Seminar in 2001, Mid-winter workshop in 2002, Anthornis in 2012, and Festival Conference conductor in 1994, 2004, and 2022, as well as teaching classes at festivals.

During this time of mourning, we send our love to Bill's family and friends. And we ask you to continue sharing your stories of Bill and his boundless energy and outstanding musicianship with your handbell family.

As you approach your renewal month, you will receive an email reminder with payment options. However, you don't have to wait until your renewal date to renew — you can log into your HMA account anytime to take care of it. While you're logged in, be sure to update your contact information and explore the many resources available to you as an HMA member. You can even set up auto-renew on your membership so you never have to think about renewing again!

Here's something you might not know: HMA Group Memberships offer a Sub-Membership option for individual ringers. For just \$10 a year (less than \$1 per month), ringers in a Group Membership can get their own login to the HMA website, access to online resources, and receive direct communications about HMA National and Area 7 information. The Group Membership point of contact (usually the director) will still receive all communications, but this is a great way to ensure your ringers are kept informed too!

# From the C.H.I.M.E. Representative

#### Area 7 C.H.I.M.E. Grant and Belltree Kit Grant

Did you know that Area 7 has two 3-octave sets of handbells and two 3-octave sets of handchimes available

to be awarded to area schools, churches, senior living facilities, and other community organizations through the C.H.I.M.E. Grant program?

The full C.H.I.M.E. Grant includes: a set of handbells or handchimes for a school year (September through May) as well as foam pads, music, technique manuals, curriculum suggestions, and support needed to start and grow a handbell/handchime program. Applications are accepted anytime and are awarded in July for the program year beginning in September.

If sets are still available once the school year is in progress, then the equipment is available for shorter term grants.

Maybe you ...

- Need an extra set of bells or chimes because you suddenly have more ringers than equipment?
- Want to do an "intro to bells" unit for a few weeks at your church, school, retirement community, or activity center?
- Want to put together a small group to play for Easter services or a special concert?
- Want to add a belltree to a performance and need some extra bells to supplement your current set?

Speaking of belltrees, Area 7 also has a Belltree Kit Grant. The Kit includes: 1 belltree stand, 2 belltree arms, 2 belltree dowel processional poles, mallets, Area 7 belltree resources, and a bag to keep all the equipment together. This is a great option for groups wanting to add belltree to their repertoire, or maybe

you aspire to be a belltree soloist and want to use the Grant to get started on your way.

There are currently sets of bells, chimes, and a belltree kit available to be granted through May 2025. Or you can always submit your grant application for the 2025-2026 program year.

# From the Southern Minnesota Sub-Chair

Handbell ensembles in Southern Minnesota have been seeking — and finding — new ways to use handbells outside of the familiar service music.

Celebration Bells of Christ United Methodist Church in Rochester repurposed Sandra Eithun's wonderful "Common Thread" from the Area 7 Festival in La Crosse as a musical "message" in the sermon slot in a service in mid-November. Bells rarely get such a prominent position in a worship service!

Rochester Area Handbells played at the Family Promise Rochester benefit concert, raising funds to aid families experiencing homelessness, and at the Rochester Interfaith Thanksgiving service. Both performances featured Eithun's "Common Thread" (we got a lot of mileage out of that one!) and both performances were great opportunities to get bells in front of audiences that don't ordinarily get to experience this art form.

Evangel United Methodist Church in Rochester has been working hard to reestablish their bell program, which fell apart from the one-two punch of the retirement of their long-time director right at the beginning of COVID. Many of their ringers have been playing with Celebration Bells of Christ UMC, and the united choir plays services at both churches. More exciting, they put together a pick-up choir for Christmas consisting of eleven youth ringers, many of whom had never rung before.

The St. Olaf Handbell Choir at St. Olaf College gave a kid's concert this past November. There were three kids bell/chime choirs from Bethel Lutheran Church in Northfield, MN, involved in the concert. They each performed a piece with the St. Olaf Choir. Kids from the audience were invited to join in on Kath Wissinger's "Chopsticks and How." Each kid was given a chime, quickly taught how to play, and the group divided into two chords. An Olaf student points to them and they play on cue. It's priceless to see the look on their faces and how serious they take it.

Looking ahead, well, winter is not a great time for events, but Rochester Area Handbells and the St. Olaf Handbell Choir are planning a joint workshop in early March. This is an opportunity for both groups to get feedback from a friendly peer. For many St. Olaf ringers this is also their first encounter with a performance-caliber bell ensemble. For Rochester Area Handbells it is a blatant recruiting pitch to try to convince Oles to come to Rochester after graduation.

# Young Ringer's Camp 101

Do you have a youth handbell choir at your church? Or do you have youth ringing with your adult ensemble? Area 7 invites all interested youth handbell ringers to join us this summer for Young Ringer's Camp! We are so excited to be returning to Camp Omega in Waterville, MN for Young Ringer's Camp on June 20-22, 2025.

Why bell camp? The three days of camp are the equivalent of seven one-hour rehearsals of ringing. It's a wonderful opportunity for young people to increase their skill level and have the opportunity to perform in a massed handbell concert. A number of directors say that their ringers are always looking for that something special to look forward to all season long. Knowing that they are going to be attending Young Ringer's Camp in June helps the ringers to stay focused learning music and serves as a great celebration for a year of hard work.

Who can come to camp? Young Ringer's Camp is open to all children and youth handbell ringers 4th grade and up. Directors can bring anywhere from their entire ensemble to a few ringers, whatever works for your choir! Less than full choirs are encouraged to attend, we can find a spot for them too!

Are there adults at camp? In addition to the guest conductor and staff from Area 7, each group is responsible for sending chaperones to be with their ringers throughout the weekend.

What if I don't know the other ringers at camp? All the events at Young Ringer's Camp are aimed at bringing youth together. We do games, team building activities, meals, service projects and ringing together. All campers will get to know one another in a very short period of time.

Where do we sleep and eat while we're at camp? The accommodations at Camp Omega are fantastic. We have our own lodge just for Young Ringer's Camp participants. There are separate areas for girls' and boys' bunk beds and bathrooms. The facility has heating and air conditioning. For meals, we all walk



up the hill from our private lodge to the main lodge for breakfast, lunch, and dinner meals.

How can we learn the music? There are three pieces of music that need to be learned in advance of attending Young Ringer's Camp. The easiest way to learn the music is to incorporate the pieces into your repertoire this season. However, if you have youth ringing with your adult ensemble, this may not always be possible. Special rehearsal sessions can be set up in the spring for interested ringers to attend in major cities (Minneapolis, Rochester, Duluth, Sioux Falls, etc.) Contact Youth Events Planner Jessica Haeder for more information.

Any ideas to pay for camp? Bringing your whole ensemble to Young Ringer's Camp can be expensive. Start thinking now of fundraising opportunities to offset the full price of camp. Can your ringers do a small concert with free-will offering to raise money? How about a special offering during a performance of the handbell choir? Is there a church foundation where you can apply for a grant or scholarship from your church? Area 7 also has one Clista Wood Memorial Scholarship available for camp. Sounds like fun, what's the next step? You've marked the date on your calendar, music is being learned by the ringers, fundraising is underway, but don't forget to REGISTER. All ringing participants and chaperones must register no later than April 1. Registration materials are available on the Area 7 website at area7.handbellmusicians.org/events/young-ringers-camp-2025. 


# **Ensemble Spotlight: Ring Out!**



When I put out the call for auditions in the summer of 2024, I had no idea if we'd find enough ringers to complete an ensemble. I was blown away when 21 ringers auditioned and joined the group! While all members had prior musical experience, several had never touched a handbell before. For others, it had been over a decade since they last rang with a group.

With the help of social media, we received an outpouring of support from across the country. We rented additional equipment and received a donation of a 4-octave set of bells, allowing us to function as a double bell choir. Before long, the group was tackling level 4 pieces with persistence and precision!

Ring Out presented its debut concert on January 17th, 2025, at Westminster Hall in Minneapolis. The concert centered around the joy, dreams, and abundant potential of new beginnings. It was an absolute joy to share our music with an audience of friends, family, and community members. Many of them had never attended a handbell performance before, and those who had got to experience a breadth of techniques and musical styles beyond what they had seen before.

Opening up the world of handbells to a broader community is at the heart of Ring Out's mission. By creating an inclusive space for ringers of all identities, we hope to create momentum toward a more welcoming handbell community for ringers and audiences alike. We also strive to support the composition of new handbell music by a diverse array of composers, making sure all audiences see stories they can relate to told in the music we perform. Several projects to produce new handbell music from new local composers are already in the works!

## **Bells & Bucks Basketball**

The Milwaukee Handbell Ensemble (MHE) is a community handbell choir, and, like many other community groups, we sometimes wonder where our next gig will be. We search and inquire at locations we would like to play, always trying to think of new places to perform and how to reach new audiences. We have played at a library, a senior center, the local high school performing arts center, in a hotel ballroom for a McDonald's franchise manager's holiday party, and, of course, many churches.

We have been fortunate to be invited by the Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra (MSO) to join them for their Holiday POPS concert for several years. That is always a highlight for us because we get to perform for so many people that we would not otherwise get to entertain. Many of those in attendance may not have seen handbells before. We had a hiatus with the MSO after the pandemic and we heard that past attendees have asked, "Where are the handbells?" or said, "We missed the handbells at this concert." It feels good to know that we are missed and appreciated!

In a recent *Overtones* article I read that our website should be kept up to date. This has become very evident for us lately. It is through our website that we have received some of our more recent inquiries. It's always nice when someone reaches out to us to help us fill in the gaps in our schedule when we may have been struggling to find a venue. It's even nicer when those requests are more unique and interesting.

We had a very interesting request in the Fall of 2023. A contact from the Milwaukee Bucks organization reached out to us to ask if we would like to join them for their big Christmas show "hoping to put together a really amazing Holiday halftime performance." For those not up on current sports teams, the Milwaukee Bucks are an NBA team that won the national championship in 2021.

"Wow, what an exciting opportunity!" was my first thought.

My second thought was, "Is this legitimate?" You can't be too sure these days with all the scams that are out there. I forwarded this to our Artistic Director, Jana Larson, to get her thoughts. She said "OMG yea!!! Oh goodness what would that look like. Let's definitely have the conversation!! Cool!"

After confirming with our ringers that the proposed date would work, I reached out to the contact at the Bucks. In a matter of days, we were in full planning mode to get all the pieces in order for this unique experience. The Bucks entertainment coordinator works with the performing groups for the National Anthem and the halftime shows. She had never worked with a bell choir before, so it was something different for all of us. As handbell ringers, we all know there is a lot of equipment. So, we had to figure out how to get ringers, bells, tables with foam, and table covers on and off the court very quickly. This, plus our performance had to be done within seven minutes.

The Milwaukee Handbell Ensemble is known for having at least one memorized piece each year, typically for our Christmas season. This started when our founding director, Dr. John Behnke, heard comments from those that sat in the orchestra seats when we played with the MSO that they could hear the bells but not see them. That next year, we had a piece memorized and played it from the lip of the stage so everyone could see us. This season, we also had a piece memorized for Christmas so we knew that would be one of the pieces to play for the Bucks halftime show.

The Bucks team wanted this to be BIG CHRISTMAS. We knew that our memorized piece, "Good King Wenceslas" was not big enough on its own. We looked at our current repertoire and decided none of those pieces really worked either. A few were BIG, but used too much equipment like lots of bass bells, chimes, or mallets. Seven minutes for two songs would be fine, but that did not include getting on and off the court.

Jana did some searching and found the perfect piece, "Christmas...in About 3 Minutes" by Douglas Wagner was chosen. There are 23 Christmas songs referenced in this one handbell piece. You can't get much more BIG CHRISTMAS than that!

With our pieces selected, it was on to logistics. The tables had to be moved on and off the court quickly, and we knew we would not be moving the tables ourselves. The Bucks had a team to do that for us. The anxieties of bells falling off the table and clanging on the court were high! We planned to play our memorized piece first. That helped because each of us carried our own bells onto the court. That left only a few extra bells for our second piece on the tables to be moved. Then, when we were done, we each grabbed as many bells as we could, to lighten the load as the tables were swiftly moved off the court.

We met at the arena about a week before the game to go over the details and for the sound crew to get a feel for how to mic up handbells. They kept telling us they know how to get the sound to carry in the arena, it'll be fine. They also had never worked with handbells before. The day of rehearsal there was no crowd noise, it sounded amazing! We knew that it would not be that quiet for our performance with a sold-out arena of over 17,000 fans. They had mics in place and told us it would be fine, but then on game day, we needed to adjust during our memorized piece and physically move closer to the microphones they had in place. While the halftime show was not shown fully on national television, we had some family and friends recording throughout the arena. It was quieter than we would have preferred but still a wonderful show!

MHE ringer Jennifer Scheler said, "Performing for the Milwaukee Bucks halftime show was an amazing opportunity to introduce handbells to a huge audience. We got the attention of many who had likely never heard a handbell ensemble before, including turning some players' heads as they returned to the court." (As we were about halfway through our second song, we could hear basketballs bouncing behind us. Jana, our director, could see it all and she made some concerned faces a couple of times. That was an experience in itself!) Jim Dahlgran, another ringer, said, "What a unique way to expose so many people to the music of handbells."
